The retarded have been rejected so often by so many that hardly a day goes by without a newspaper article proclaiming the injustices suffered by citizens having to put up with handicapped people living and breathing around them.

Not so in Farmington. The city fathers, the po-lice, the neighbors, the merchants should all stand and take a bow. The home built and soon to be occu-pied at Farmington and Freedom roads is a testi-mony to each of you.

Community Living Centers thanks you. The hand-icapped thank you. You have made a dream come

true, a lovely home for people who might, without your kindness, suffer rejection and fear. You have made this possible by your acceptance, help in zoning, police protection, swiftness and understanding approvals, building and engineering expertise and kindness:

We salute you.
For our readers who aren't acquainted with Community Living Centers, let me provide brief background. We have homes for adults with disabilities that require them to have supervision in their daily living. Each of our homes have a house manager or house parents who create a home-like atmosphere for the members.

for the members.1

THE HANDICAPPED living with us receive a minimal amount of daily allowance from Social Security or Supplemental Security Income (\$13.50) for their daily expenses. Our homes are operated with this daily allotment. This amount pays for all expenses, household salaries, and transportation for the people living in the home.

We are truly non-profit. With the rising daily costs it would not be possible for us to operate without the donations we receive from generous friends, several clubs, and families. This sounds like a lot of



money \$410 per person per month, with 12 people it's \$4,920 per month for three salaries, food for 13 people, rent, heat, lights, car payments, gas and oil, tires, insurance, taxes, and hidden costs — it never quite makes it until the end of the month. But with understanding and generous friends, we've never been in the red.

Is this an expensive way for our disabled citizens

Some facts. It costs over \$100 a day for a person to live in an institution. Compare — \$13.50.

WE HAVE NINE homes in six cities in Oakland County, 100 clients in all. Forty-five of these people are in school or sheltered workshops. Some are using school tax dollars until they're 25 years old. Even with the use of this tax they are less of a burden on society.

Those in the sheltered workshop pay income tax on their small wages. The other 55 people are holding competitive jobs—dish washers, bus boys, salad girls, janitors, housekeepers and laundry workers in nursing homes. And these are supplementing their Social Security payments with their own waspe

These are tax paying citizens, not tax users.
Without these homes of ours and the daily supervision these people need, they could not be good responsible citizens able to use their talents and live a
productive life in as normal an atmosphere as you
or I.

We do pay taxes, we do support our merchants, we do belong to the Chamber of Commerce, we do support Farmington and all it stands for. Farmington has understanding and fortitude to stand up to the world and accept and help to build a better tomorrow for those of our fellow men that are in need. are in need.


