

Meet to be held Saturday

Stevenson eyes Observerland title repeat

Fourteen high school teams face the almost impossible task of dethroning defending champion Livonia Stevenson Saturday at the 10th annual Observerland Track and Field Relays.

The meet will get underway at 10 a.m. with the pole vault. The remaining field events will start at 11 a.m. The first of nine running events — the four-mile relay — is slated for 2 p.m.

Hilbert Junior High, which is at 2640 Puritan (west of Beech Daly between Five and Six Mile roads), is again the site.

Admission is \$1 for students and \$1.50 for adults. The tickets are good for all day.

Stevenson last year placed first in five events while rolling up 37 points, the largest point-total by any team in the history of the relays.

Just about everyone is back this year for the Spartans. That leads John MacKenzie, the meet director, to believe that Stevenson will likely run away with the title again.

"I think for the first time, I can sit back and say my choice is going to be easy," said MacKenzie, who coached at Stevenson for many years. "I don't want to put the hex on anybody, but Stevenson has to be a heavy favorite."

The Spartans have not lost a dual meet since the 1978 season. Already this year they have won the prestigious Elks Relays.

"Just about every year (the Observerland) competition has come down to the last event or two," said MacKenzie. "But this year, I just see the teams slicing up one another and not going into Stevenson's strength too much."

In addition to Stevenson, the field will consist of Livonia Bentley, Redford Bishop Borgess, Plymouth Central, Detroit Catholic Central, Livonia Churchill, Farmington, Livonia Franklin, Farmington Hills, and Farmington Hills.

Also competing will be Southfield-Lathrup, North Farmington, Northville, Redford Union, Plymouth Salem and Redford Thurston.

MacKenzie said that he would not be surprised if the Spartans rolled up the largest margin of victory in the history of the meet with their large roster of talent spread across all events.

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The two-mile relay time of 8:07.8 set in 1973 by Salem Stevenson's excellent crew of 800 runners have a good shot at setting a new mark.

The long jump relay aggregate distance of 60-74 set in 1973 by Stevenson Farmington High has three jumpers who have leaped better than 20 feet this spring.

MacKenzie added that any of the distance records could be broken with good weather and a fast track.

Scoring is based on five points for first place, four for second, three for third, two for fourth and one for fifth in every event.

Three people from each team will compete in the field events. Their best height or distance will be added together and then tallied for team scoring.

Four runners from each team will compete in the track events.

The running portion of the meet has been moved to the afternoon for the first time in the 10-year history of the meet. The major reason was to make for a shorter day for the competitors.

Tennis center offers lessons

The new tennis complex at Waterford Oaks County Park in Pontiac will open its first season with a special tennis clinic for adults.

The clinic, which begins the week of May 5 and lasts through May 30, is for players who have had no previous tennis instruction. Instruction will focus on the basic strokes, scoring and etiquette of the game.

Sessions will meet twice a week at 5 p.m., 6 p.m. or 7 p.m. The fee is \$20 per person.

Beginning in June, classes will be offered for beginners, advanced beginners and intermediate players of all ages. These sessions last from June 16 to July 11, July 14 to Aug. 1 and Aug. 4-28.

Classes will be held at 5 p.m., 6 p.m. and 7 p.m., meeting twice a week for one-hour sessions. Fees are \$20 for beginners, \$22 for advanced beginners and \$25 for intermediate players.

The classes will be supervised by tennis veterans Greg Lestan and Kathy Placilla, director and assistant director of the Waterford Oaks Tennis Complex. Lestan, a Pontiac resident, was previously the tennis director for the city of Sterling Heights. Placilla is the tennis director at the Court House Racquet Club in West Bloomfield.
