College dickers over Dickinson

Schoolcraft College may use the soon-to-be-closed Dickinson Junior High School in Livonia next fall if . . .

"if": a cheap lease agreement giving Schoolcraft the option to buy the building, at 18000 Newburgh, a mile east of the college. The Board of Trustees last week au-thorized Schoolcraft administrators to

thorized Schoolcraft administrators to negotiate a two-year lease with the Livonia Board of Education. If an agreement is reached, Schoolcraft plans to sublease part of the building back to the Livonia schools. The college would pay operating and maintenance costs for the building.

SCHOOLCRAFT President C. Nelson Grote said the two parties have to "find out how far apart we are. It's a matter of rolling up our sleves and getting down to nut cutting. Livonia will close the school in June. Dickinson is among 21 schools closed by the school board in recent years due to declining enrollment.

Schoolcraft is seeking a two-year lease to "buy time" to determine if it could operate the building on a break-even basis in the future.

Grote said it's possible Wayne State University, which is looking for a western Wayne County center, would rent part of Dickinson in the future.

will try to achieve in negotiations. They include:

- Rent from \$1\$ to \$100 per year.

- Schoolcraft to have control of the building and grounds.

- The lease may be extended with any rent increase agreed to in advance.

- An option of future purchase by the college.

WHILE APPROVING negotiations, several trustees doubted Schoolcraft could operate the building without losing money.

Expenses for using a little over 40 percent of Dickinson next year would exceed revenues 9 \$4,330. In 1981-82, the deficit would increase to \$19,000 with 64 percent of Dickinson used, according to the administration.

Should the college lease Dickinson, it would move community education

would move community education classes to Dickinson and begin develop-ing small business courses which would, eventually be held at Dickinson.
