

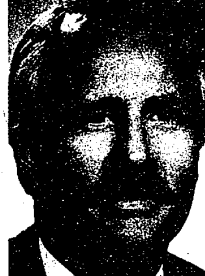
John Foy named vice president

Doctor is hip expert

"The concern is with the weight put on the hip," Swienkowski said. "The up and down piston-like motion loosens it. It can slip downward."

Once the artificial hip is loosened, there are no alternatives. That's why Swienkowski favors the resurfacing procedure.

"IT ALLOWS OPTIONS," he said. "The space loss is no more than eight to 10 millimeters. We can perform fusion if resurfacing doesn't take."

Post-operative recovery for

resurfacing patients is six weeks. The period of rehabilitation is shorter with total hip replacement surgery.

"The end results are the same," Swienkowski said. "But resurfacing saves a lot of bone and leaves options."

To date, none of Swienkowski's patients has experienced a loosening of the resurfaced joint.

"They can work, play golf, live their lives normally," he said.

Five years from now resurfacing operations will surpass total hip replacement surgery in popularity, Swienkowski predicts.
