"The concern is with the weight put on the hip," Swienckowski said. "The up and down piston-like motion losens it. It can slip down-

ward."

Once the artificial hip is loosened, there are no alternatives. That's why Swienckowski favors the resurfacing procedure.

"IT ALLOWS OPTIONS," he said.
"The space loss is no more than eight to 10 millimeters. We can perform fusion if resurfacing doesn't

"The end results are the same,"
