CITY COUNCIL MEETING
APRIL 28, 1980

The City Council of the City of Farmington Hills held a regular meeting April 28, 1980. Mayor Soronen opened the meeting at 7:30 p.m. Members present were: Burwell, Lange, Dolan, Alkateeb and Wolf. Others present were City Manager Savage, Deputy City Clerk Thomas and City Attorney Pochman. Councilmember Oppenheimer was absent.

Mayor Soronen proclaimed the following: National Be Kind to Animal Week, Moslem Shrine Newspaper sale May 2 and 3, National Music Week May 4 through 11, Small Business Week May 11 through 18, 1980.

Minutes of April 14 and April 21 were approved. After the Public Hearing Council adopted the resolution approving the project for A.C.E. Inc. Project.

Approval was given to use calcium chloride in place of road oil in the City's 1980 Dust Control Program, giving the district which previously had the option of finding a contractor to oil which will comply with the City specifications in all respects, with reply before May 9, 1980.

Resolution approving Project Area and Designating Project District Area was approved for Arrowsmith Tool & Die, Inc. Project and appointment of two additional directors, James Peirce and Christopher Gopigan, to the Economic Development Corporation.

The request to hold a Festival on June 13 through June 15, by the Holy Cross Greek Orthodox Church was approved subject to no amplifiers after 11:00 P.M. and complying in all respects to City requirements.

Consideration of resolution authorizing condemnation proceedings for property needed for public utility easements for Old Homestead Sewer Special Assessment District was adjourned until May 12, 1980.

City Manager's recommendation to establish a special assessment district for road improvement was approved for Thirteen Mile Road, Nine Mile Road and Inkster Road and if feasible to set the date of May 27, 1980 for the Necessity Hearing. ORDINANCE NO. C-464-80

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 1.146 (2) OF CHAPTER 9

EMPLOYEES RETIREMENT SYSTEM, OF TITLE 1 ADMINISTRATION

OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF FARMINGTON

THE CITY OF FARMINGTON ORDAINS:

1.246. Members Deposit Fund.

(2) A member's contributions to the retirement system shall be three percent (3%) of the first Four Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800.00) of his/her annual salary plus five percent (5%) of the portion, if any, of his/her annual salary which is in excess of Four thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800.00), provided that the city shall hereafter make such contributions where required by agreement or contract between the city and the member employees. Such contributions by the city shall be credited to the Pension Reserve Fund as defined in Section 1.248 of the Farmington City Code and such contributions by the city shall not be refundable to the employee.

This ordinance was introduced at a regular meeting of the Farmington City Council on April 7, 1980, was adopted and enacted at the next regular meeting on April 21, 1980 and will become effective July 1, 1980.
