

Raiders tie for 3rd in Observerland Relays

Stevenson dominated to such a degree that it won six of the eight running events, four in a row — the sprint medley, shuttle hurdle, 440 and mile — to close the competition.

"When one kid lays down and gets hurt or doesn't feel good, all the other kids pick up," said Tom Bills, coach of the Spartans. "Everybody picks up everybody else. That's exactly what they've been doing ever since I got them."

Livonia Churchill finished second to Stevenson with 30 points. Detroit Catholic Central, making only its second appearance in the relays, tied with North Farmington for third with 21.

As expected, Stevenson did especially well in the sprint and middle distance relays.

The foursome of Ted Ford, Jim

Recker, Rick Arnold and Kevin Gallagher clocked 1:33.53 to win the 800 relay.

Ford, Recker and Gallagher teamed with Kevin Spala to claim victory in the 440 relay, 45.2 seconds. Recker and Arnold combined with Pat Greis and Dave Hall to triumph in the shuttle hurdle relay, 58.8.

The Spartans also won the sprint medley relay in 2:23.0 with Ford, Gallagher, Joe Jacobites and Rich Dubois and the mile relay in 3:28.9 with Arnold, Jacobites, Dubois and Hall.

Grant, Jacobites and Dubois teamed with Dave Lukko to win the two mile relay with an effort of 8:25.7.

Stevenson also placed second in both the high jump and discus relays during the competition.

ONLY TWO RECORDS were set during the meet and both came in the field events.

Plymouth Salem shattered the mark in the discus by more than 13 feet.

Bob Pittaway, John Frozan and Mark Tanski combined for an aggregate distance of 429.9.

The other record was broken by Farmington in the long jump. Rick Curtis, Dave Erwin and Jeff Beard leaped an aggregate distance of 62.4.

The old record was 60.74 and it stood for seven years.

Churchill, which placed third in the team standings, scored points all but three events, the 13 events. The Chargers didn't score any first-place points, but coach Fred Price said he was still pleased with the effort.

"To our kids credit, they scored in 10 of 13 events. I don't think anyone else can say that," said Price.

ANDY DILLON, one of the premier distance runners in the state, anchored both of Catholic Central's winning teams.

Dillon teamed with John Casey, Kevin Donner and Mike Nugent to win the four mile relay, 18:39.4, and worked with Matt Ronayne, Casey and Nugent to set the winning pace in the distance medley relay, 10:43.5.

Farmington, in addition to winning the long jump, took home gold medals in the high jump. Craig Kiely, Jeff Beard and Dave Erwin produced an aggregate height of 17-10.

North Farmington finished first in the shot put with a distance of 141-7. Tim Warren, George Houttkier and Marty Toomajan turned the trick.
