## Baby named Melissa Joy for a very good reason

Don Horn bought his wife Linda a Mother's Day card last year. But when she miscarried — for the fifth, time in four years — he threw it out. That card would have come in handy Sunday. The Clawson couple spent this whother's Day showing off the newborn daughter they'd almost given up hoping for.

"A year ago I didn't think I'd ever be a mother," recalls Mrs. Horn, who had good reason for naming the baby Melissa Joy. "We feel pretly lucky to have our little girl."

When Michigan State University students Linda Wesler of Troy and Don Horn of Garden City became engaged in November 1973, they planned to start a family after a year of marriage. "It was another step out of our love," said the new mother. "It just seemed part of it all."

But a month after the engagement,

But a month after the engagement, Linda learned she had acute leukemia. The Avondale High graduate spent Christmas in protective isolation in Crittenton Hospital where she received 161 units of blood and chemotherapy

Expected to live less than a year, she decided to cancel the wedding. "I didn't want to put Don through that," she remembers

BUT HER FIANCE refused to give up hope. He insisted on planning for the future, even bringing a Bride's magazine to the hospital so she could pick out a welding gown.

Linda was so weak it took her four house to go hive the magazine. "But house to go hive gown to the country of the proper me" "she said. "He kept me going."

After five weeks of treatment, Linda went into remission. Her doctor gave permission for a wedding, which was moved up from June to March 8, 1974.

While feeling better, the Michigan State grad was not allowed to keep house so they moved in for a while with her parents in Troy. And plans to use the degree in delinquency and crime prevention were out.

During the first year of marriage, Linda became pregnant. She miscarried and learned she could not carry a baby full term while taking chemoth-

pady full term while taking chemoth-erapy drugs.

But she couldn't take birth control pills because of the additional risk of combining them with the drugs.

After three more miscarriages, her doctor suggested she have a tubal ligation to prevent further pregnancies. But she refused, choosing to go off her medication instead.

THE DECISION was "scary" for Linda, who desperately wanted a child but was afraid she might become ill again. The couple had been reassured through genetic counseling that her leukennia is not hereditary.

Her health remained stable, but she lost another baby last April. "I didn't want to go through it again," she said of the miscarriage, especially upsetting because there seemed to be no reason for it.

"The emotional thing is so great when you lose a child — even at just they you lose a child — even at just eight weeks. It's very hard to handle."

Linda did her best to relax during the ent pregnancy, despite worried friends and relatives. Watching closely were couples she and Don had met through their volunteer work for the Children's Leukemia Foundation of Michigan.

Both serve on the state board of the Southfield based foundation. She is past president of the South Oakland CLF Chapter and Don is current president.

Linda received a Heart of Gold ward from United Foundation in 1979. Both Horns were given the Sandra Ann Brown Award for outstanding service

Brown Awaru to School to the CLF.

"A lot of leukemia patients were watching my pregnancy," explained the new mother, who said many doctors discourage them from having children

"THEY FEEL we should just be grateful we're still alive. But you can't live life like that. The Horns sold their small house in Royal Oak and moved into a larger one in Clawson with a untrery.

Baby Melissa Joy arrived March 2 by the Lamaze-LeBoyer method, with her dad cutting the umbilical cord and giving the infant her first bath.
