Things heavenly are best au naturel

Travel promoters like to add a little religion to their tourist attractions for special effects. They especially like Leonardo Da Vinc's "Last Supper."
Sometimes its religion-as-art and sometimes its religion-as-nature but the two common presences are The Voice and The Lights, Oh, yes, and let's not forget The Music.
Tve seen three examples lately, one in Los Angeles and two in Natural Bridge, Va. Each one outdid the last.
Forest Lawn in Los Angeles is a cemetery that has gained celebrity status. Some aspects of it are very attractive, such as the landscaping and the small stone church.

The cemetery's rendering of "The Last Supper' is in a carved stone building, in a room surrounded by small sculptures. Visitors are asked to sit down on rows of folding chairs. The Lights go out. The Voice resonates through the

room.

The are drawn curtains across the wall, and at the right moment they part to show the reproduction of "The Last Supper." As a work of art, it is interesting. As religious theater, it is full of light and sound but not taste. I saw "The Last Supper" again this week at Natural Bridge, a scenic natural wonder privately promed.

Thomas Jefferson was so impressed with this natural bridge that he asked for and received a land grant to own it. Soldiers from the Revolutionary Warn Samall bits of lead from the top. The lead, as it fell, froze into shape when it hit the water and became a bullet.

froze into shape when it hit the water and became a bullet. In those days you could probably wander down the hill for nothing and look at the bridge. Nowadays it costs \$3. At the top of the hill, surrounding the parking lot, are several red brick buldings with traditional Virginia columns. One is the entrance to the bridge, and a gift shop. Another is a tastfedily designed hotel with a good dining room, run by the same private company. A third is the Natural Bridge Wax Museum.

The wax museum traces the history of the area from stone age men through all the Virginia presidents, in a passable array of wax figures. The piece de resistance is through a final door and has nothing to do with Natural Bridge.

GO THROUGH THE DOOR. Sit in rows of folding chairs. The Lights go out. The Music begins. The Voice recites the story of the last meal Christ and his disciples ale together. The Lights go on. There, across the stage in front of you, is a life-sized reproduction of "The Last Supper" in wax figures.

The Lights and The Voice begin again. The Crucifixion appears behind the supper scene and finally The Resurrection. The owner and maker is justly proud of what he has wrought with his hands. I cannot bring myself to tell him that the religious theater is not in keeping with the setting.

Later that night, we go downhill to watch the sound and light show, The Day of Creation, played on Natural Bridge. Here, too, we have The Voice, The Lights and The Music. Only this time they were saying "On the first day, God created... As the last note of music is played, and The Voice Tades away, I see that the woman in front of me is crying. It is apparently quite common for this kind of religious theater to evoke this

response.

I, too, want to cry, but for a different reason
The best way I know to honor the creator of a natural wonder like Natural Bridge is to leave it alone with the trees, the birds and the sky.

Highway 11, the old Valley Pike, from Winchester to Lexington, gives you a good taste of this wonderful old valley, but be prepared to fight the Civil War all the way. In Winchester, a narrow road and two brick walls separates the Union cemetery from the Stonewall Jackson cemetery where Valley heroes are buried. There is a well-restored old stone house called Abrams Delight from Revolutjonary times, but the most visited house in town is Stonewall Jackson's headquarters.

Jackson is the living hero of the Shenandoah. He rides his bronze horse through many towns along the valley floor, and his name is on everybody's lips, from the site of the Battle of Winchester to the These filded were the gramary of the Confederacy.
