Harrison wins 1st dual meet

North Farmington won the city boys' track championship for the third-straight year, scoring 70 points in the annual tri-meet May 6 at Farmington High.

Farmington finished second with 67½ points, and Farmington Harrison followed with 29½.

Coach Ron Holland's North squad

swept the half and quarter mile events. Dave Hooper won the 880 in 2:06.0, John Winterbottom finished second in 2:06.5 and Jamie Bothwell was third in 2:07.7. Winterbottom won the 440 in :53.0. Bothwell came in at :53.7, and Karl Hamina took third at :53.9.

Gregg Rapp won the mile run for North Farmington with a time of 4:34.7. North's mile relay (Hamina,

Hooper, Mike Talcott and Winterbottom) won in 3:38.0.

Farmington had outstanding performances from Rick Curtis (21-3 to win the long jump), Craig Kietly (6-2 to win the high jump) and John Murphy (10:04.1 in the two-mile run).

Harrison had two first places as Ken Kopko won the discus at 130-4, and Sterling Herrmann won the 120-yard high hurdles in :16.0.

North Farmington took another step toward an unbeaten conference season last Thursday with a 103-29 win over Redford Thurston in the Northwest Suburban League. North sports a 4-0 league record and a 7-0 overall mark.

Hamina won two events, the 400-meter dash (:54.4) and the 200-meter dash (:24.4). Winterbottom won the 800-meter run (2:01.4), and George Houtteker won the shot put (48-0). Thurston's Rick Rudd won the 100-meter dash (:11.3) and the discus (131-3).

Raider stickers romp

North Farmington's baseball team, which got off to a slow start because of injuries, is roaring now with five-straight victories through last Thursday.

North coach Jerry Maxwell watched Kevin Shaw, a sophomore righthander, pitch a seven-hitter last Thursday as the Raiders nipped Garden City East, 3-2, in a Northwest Suburban League contest.

Shaw, who struck out two and walked two, pitched to three batters in the seventh inning before junior southpaw John Jeffery took over and got the side out.

Jim Carrier led North's six-hit attack with two hits in two trips. He also knocked in two runs, scored a run and stole two bases. Teammate Rex Baker doubled and scored a run.

Earlier last week, North blanked Redford Union, 2-0, in another NSL game.

Winning pitcher Rich Nutter, who missed six games this season because of mononucleosis, worked six innings and fanned eight. Junior Matt Rued took over with the bases loaded and no outs in the seventh inning — and struck out the first two batters and got the other on a pop up.

Rued, who plays first base when he's

not on the mound, contributed a single and a triple. Tremonti Greg Meggas had two hits and knocked in a run.

North has a 7-4 overall record and a 3-2 mark in the Northwest Suburban League.

BRUCE MORRISON made it three-straight pitching victories last week as he scattered eight hits in Farmington Harrison's 5-2 win over Walled Lake Western in the Western Six League.

Morrison's big test came in the third inning — and he passed with flying colors. With the bases loaded and two out, Morrison fanned Western slugger Rob King on a three-and-two pitch.

Harrison had nine hits. John Recker tripled in a run and then scored on an error in the fourth inning as the Hawks overcame a 1-0 deficit.

The victory lifted coach John Herrington's Harrison squad to 6-7 overall and 2-2 in the Western Six League.

Dan Brown pitched a one-hitter to help Milford-Lakeland foil Farmington High, 1-0, in the Inter Lakes League. Brown struck out five and walked three.

Farmington pitcher Brian Bruce was outstanding in defeat, throwing a two-hitter, striking out five and walking one in seven innings. Barry Williams produced Farmington's only hit, a first-inning single.

Lakeland scored its run in the second inning as Edelman came home on Smith's deep grounder to shortstop.

Harrison entertains Northville in a 4 p.m. game today. On Tuesday, North Farmington plays at Westland John Glenn. Farmington travels to Waterford Township on Wednesday.

Win city championship

North girls whip rivals

North Farmington's girls' track team duplicated the feat accomplished by their male counterparts last week. North won the girls' city championship, scoring 76½ points.

Farmington High placed second with 55½ points in the annual tri-meet held this year at North Farmington Harrison was third with 24 points.

Lori Kolodziej won two events for North, the 100-meter dash (:14.0) and the 200-meter dash (:28.3). She also ran a leg on North's 1600-meter relay (with Jennifer Raebler, Nancy Hughes and Joann Cromwell), which won with a 4:24.3 clocking.

Hughes won the shot put (32-7). Sue Potter won the discus (67-4½), and Pam McCann won the high jump (4-9).

North's 800-meter relay (Raebler, Meg Henrich, Hughes and Patty O'Brien) won in 1:53.4. The Raiders' 440-meter relay (O'Brien, Raebler, Henrich and Liz Gasvoda) won in 55.3.

Farmington High's Ann Barber won two individual events, the 3200-meter run (12:38.0) and the 1600-meter run (5:40.0). Chris Looser won the 400-meter run (:1.4) for Farmington, and teammate Julie Tadrzynski won the long jump (15-6¼).

Harrison had a double winner in Beth Dilley, who won the 100 hurdles (:18.4) and the 200 hurdles (:32.1). Linda Tremonti of Harrison won the 800-meter run in 2:38.1.

In another recent meet, Farmington Our Lady of

Mercy won a triple-dual, beating Birmingham Marian (80-43), Harper Woods Bishop Gallagher (78-45) and Detroit Dominican (116-7). Mercy is 5-0 in dual meets.

Beth Bosse of Mercy won the discus with a toss of 105-2. Teammate Micha Sullivan won the mile run in 5:36.0. Mercy's 440 relay (Cathy Bridges, Angie Jagers, Roxy Johnston and Sonya Howcott) won with a time of :54.1.

North whipped Redford Thurston, 100-23, in another dual meet. Hughes won the shot put (34-6) and Potter won the discus (60-6¼). Julie Laatsch won the 800-meter run in 2:40.6, and Sarah Hooper won the 200 low hurdles (33.4).

Plymouth Canton whipped Harrison, 72-51. Dilley won three events for the Hawks, taking the 110 hurdles (:17.4), the 220 hurdles (:32.0) and the 220 dash (:26.8). She also took second in the discus with a 94-foot effort.

Pontiac Northern downed Farmington, 92-44. Farmington's first places: Diane Kangas (6:11.0 in the mile), Chris Looser (:52.2 in the 440), Barber (2:36.0 in the 800) and Lori Stevenson (13:52.9 in the two mile).

On Wednesday, Mercy runs against Bishop Borgess at Brother Rice. Also on Wednesday, Waterford runs at Farmington, North runs at Redford Union, and Harrison runs at Waterford Mott.
