

Brother Rice cager signs with OU

One of the county's outstanding prep basketball players — Rob Manilla of Birmingham Brother Rice, has signed a national letter of intent to attend Oakland University.

The 6-3, 190-pound two-year starter helped lead the Warriors to a 20-6 mark this past winter, including district and regional championships. Manilla was named the team's most valuable player.

As a junior, Manilla, averaged 13 points as Rice compiled a 21-4 mark.

"Robby is a very complete basketball player," said Birmingham Brother Rice coach Bill Norton. "He's a tremendous competitor."

"He was one of the leaders in all statistics — assists, rebounds, field-goal percentage, scoring, and, he did a lot of things that doesn't show in a statistics sheet, like drawing the opponent's top player. He chose Oakland University because he wanted to be part of a rising program."

Manilla, a forward, was a first-team All-Area Observer & Eccentric basketball selection. He was also a first-team member of the Catholic League all-star squad.

Perhaps his best game last winter was Rice's 56-53 defeat of Detroit Catholic Central. Manilla scored 15 points, and held All-American Barry Spencer to 19. More importantly, Manilla held Spencer to just two field goals in the second half of that game.

Manilla also figured prominently in

Rice's Southfield-Lathrup Regional victory over Southfield. He held University of Michigan-bound Vincent Bean to 17 points.

Rice's season ended in the quarterfinals when the Warriors were upset by Ulica Eisenhower, 38-36. Manilla tied for team scoring honors in that game with eight points.

"Rob comes from a very solid basketball program," said Frederick, who will be starting his second full season as OU coach this winter. "He is a very fundamentally sound basketball player who will be seeing a lot of action for us next year."

Manilla chose Oakland University over Southern Illinois, the Citadel and the Virginia Military Academy.

SWIMMING CAMP

Hawk netters top Western

Dave Brady won the No. 1 singles match last Wednesday to start Farmington Harrison on its way to a 7-0 thumping of Walled Lake Western last Wednesday in a Western Six League tennis meet. The win lifted Harrison to 7-1 overall and 5-1 in the conference.

Brady bested Jim Graycheck, 6-1, 6-

California State at Chico to four consecutive NCAA Division II National Swimming and Diving championships from 1973-76. This year's title was his fifth straight championship.

Maglischo's swimming achievements have also been recognized in OU's summer swimming camp as the enrollment more than doubled since he began last summer.

"We try to put emphasis on the development of swimming skills," said Maglischo. "We'll be showing films of some national champions, and videotaping each camper two or three times weekly so we can get a very concentrated analysis of their strokes."

The OU swimming camp, which has two different sessions (June 15-20, and June 22-27), is designed to teach new competition skills to the novice as well as to the more experienced swimmer.

"We're going to group the campers according to age and ability," Maglischo said. "The older swimmers will concentrate more on techniques such as strokes, turns, etc. We will have a

small coach-to-camper ratio to insure good instruction. We will also swim a lot so no one need fear losing conditioning."

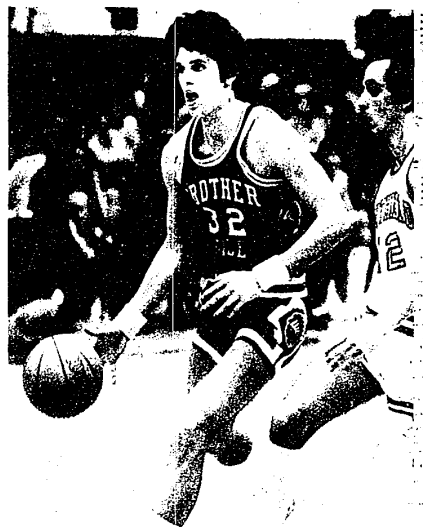

SWIM RECRUIT

Steve Gallagher, a 6-5, 215-pound swimmer, has signed a national letter of intent to attend Oakland University, according to Pioneer swimming coach Ernie Maglischo.

Gallagher transferred from Northern Michigan University, when the school dropped its swimming program. He gained All-American honors by finishing seventh in the 100-yard butterfly at the NCAA Division II championships at Youngstown State University this year.

The sophomore swimmer was the Middle Continent League champion in the 100-yard butterfly with a time of 0:51.5. He also won the 200-yard butterfly with a time of 1:55.3.

Quincy signs OCC's Clausell

It's a small college with a big-time basketball program.

That's how Darryl Clausell, formerly of Oakland Community College and Southfield High School, views his decision to attend Quincy College in the fall.

Clausell, OCC's second-leading scorer last season with a 15.5 scoring average, accepted an athletic scholarship to the NAIA Division II powerhouse because of its "good academic program" in his field of computer engineering and its "excellent basketball program."

Quincy coach Sherrill Hanks is one of the most successful small college coaches in the country, having won over 20 games in each of his last 20 years, according to OCC coach Tom McPhillips. That includes a string of eight straight 20 or more win seasons since taking over at Quincy.

"They have a national reputation," McPhillips said. "It's a hotbed of basketball in Illinois."

Several of the Quincy games are carried on local cable television and all are broadcast on radio. Despite the team's Division II status, over half of its games are against Division I opponents.

In addition to his scoring ability, Clausell, a 6-foot-3 guard, was OCC's top defensive player.

Although not guaranteed a starting position at Quincy, Clausell will have a solid shot at one. "They (Quincy coaches) told me on the phone that they recruited him to be a starter," McPhillips said. "They usually don't recruit junior college players to sit on the bench."

"I told Darryl he'd have to go down there and earn it, though."

Clausell carried a 3.0 grade point average. OCC teammate Anthony Barnard, who led the squad in scoring last season, has also been contacted by Quincy team officials concerning a possible scholarship but has not made a decision, as of yet.
