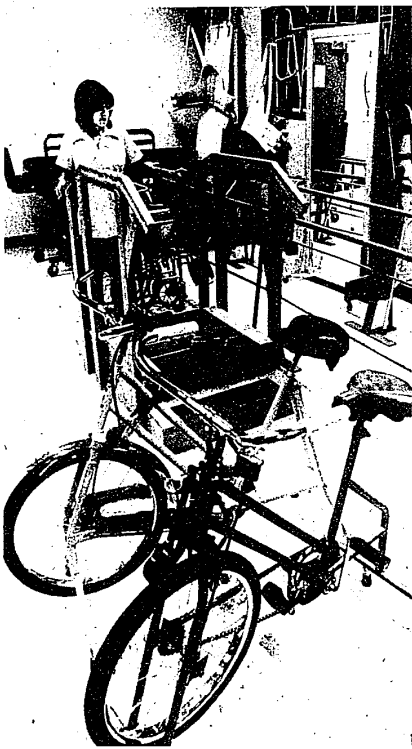


Botsford General notes national hospital week



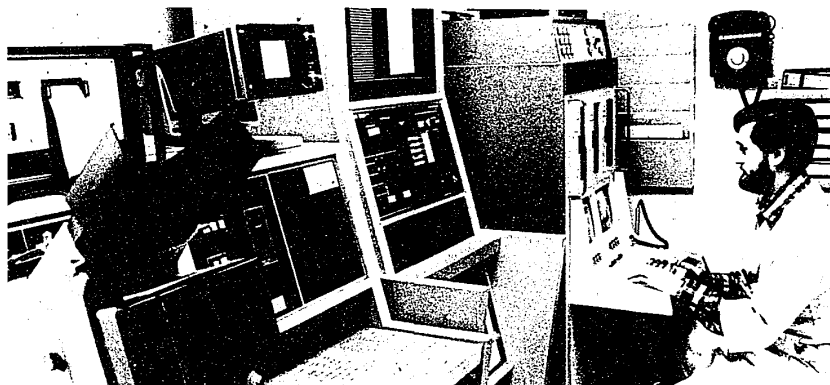
Checking her equipment is Kathy Atkinson, physical therapist technician, who aids the sick on the road to recovery.

The American Hospital Association has designated May 11-17 as National Hospital Week, a time to give recognition to local hospitals.

In Farmington Hills' case, that's Botsford General Hospital, a growing osteopathic health care facility that has 310 patient beds.

Botsford is also a teaching hospital for the Michigan State University School of Medicine. It trains 30 interns and 59 residents in 12 specialties of practice.

In the hospital's future are plans for a multi-million dollar expansion project to be built adjacent to the hospital grounds in the Grand River-8 Mile area.

The meeting's attendance will be limited to 150 participants. The FAEE meeting will be its last of the year. A gift from the proceeds of this meeting will be given to the Farmington Hills Library to use in increasing their collection on the gifted child.

the forms to forecast future travel habits in the region, use reliable information on non-rush hour travel patterns and to understand the impact of the changing energy situation on regional transportation concerns. (Does the gasoline situation drive persons to mass transit?) The survey is being conducted in conjunction with the 1980 census. The \$32,000 survey receives 80 percent of its funds from the Federal Urban Mass Transportation Administration (UMTA) with the remaining 20 per cent of the money coming from SEMTA.

PETTY OFFICER Jon L. Zawacki, son of Leonard and Betty Zawacki of Farmington Hills, was awarded the Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medal for his contributions to the mission of the U.S.S. Vulcan and to all ships deployed in the Mediterranean. He has been awarded a letter of commendation from Capt. H.A. Spencer, commanding officer of the U.S.S. Vulcan for sustained and outstanding performance aboard the naval vessel. The U.S.S. Vulcan is the first vessel to make a Mediterranean cruise with women crew members who are permanently assigned to the ship. Zawacki has been awarded also the title of sailor of the year on board his ship. He is married to the former Cynthia Duckett. Zawacki attended Harrison High School.
