Hills department called Fire ravages lumber yard

from downtown Detroit as Haggerty Lumber and Supply in Commerce Township burned Thursday night, just beyond West Bloomfield's Haggerty Road border.

Farmington Hills Fire Department volunteers joined units from nine other communities to fight the blaze, estimated to have caused \$10-15 million worth of damage.

The fire broke out about 8 p.m. and was brought under control sometime

after midnight, according to on-the-scene reports.

Cause of the fire was still unknown Friday, Preliminary reports say arson isn't suspected.

Two night workers reportedly heard the fire alarm go off in the sales build-ing and routinely turned in the alarm. Returning to the scene, they saw ap-proximately eight feet of the sales area involved and figured they could put it out even before the fire department ar-rived, a witness said.

SUODENLY, THE flames hit the ceiling and spread, egged on by hiss of sawdust, cans of paint, thinners and raw izmber. Adjacent. businesses such as Markey Brotters Wholesale Lumber, Hair Research and Dick Morris Chevrolet were threatened, but preventative 'dousing by firefighters kept the flames from spreading to those buildings. The fire at its height was reported as so intense that utility poles 150 feet away from the building were smoking or smoldering and glass globes atop

them melted.

Owner John O'Reilly reportedly indicated business would go on as usual following the mopping up effort, but witnesses were skeptical.
