

Beauty from the sea

If oysters hadn't been blessed with the ability to create pearls, somebody probably would have invented them. For there is no other jewel that enhances a woman's beauty more than a pearl — except perhaps when the pearls are mixed with the gleam of a 14K gold chain.

Award winning jewelry designer
Marcus Spoutz of the Gold Anvil in
Franklin Village has been paying a lot
of attention to pearls lately. "One
merely has to take a look at what women are buying and wearing to know that
pearls are surfacing as the top jewelry
trend of the "86s," he said.

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Spoutz has taken the sculptured
beauty of the Biwa pearl and created a
pearl sidle necklace. "Fashion pairing
of gold and pearls usually tends to add
a certain tailored tunch to the misture." said Spoutz. "But, creating a

wear the piece with a formal gown as

Some of his slide necklaces also include gold pieces molded in an irregular pearl shape with some of the gold pearis paved with diamonds.

Spoutz prefers to use Biwa pearls because of the high luster and unique shape. He explained that fresh-water pearls from Lake Biwa in Japan are the only pearls which can correctly be called, "Biwa pearls."

ALTHOUGH fresh-water pearls were previously available only from Lake Biwa in Japan and from United States, fresh-water pearls are now being imported from the Chinese main-land. "It is known," said Spoutz, "that the

Chinese first cultivated fresh-water pearls in the 13th Century, though it re-mained for the Japanese to perfect the method of cultivating perfectly round pearls from living oysters."

Fresh-water pearls are not the prod-ucts of oysters but are cultivated in several varieties of clam-like mollusks, producing pearls in many shapes and colors.

Classic, round, cultured pearls are a product of the saltwater oceans and are cultivated mainly in Japan in the Inland Sea areas. The saltwater pearl is grown in carefully innoculated and mutured our fore. nurtured oysters.

On the practical side, pearls require considerate care. "They must be kept from excessive heat and perspiration," cautioned Spout. "Direct contact with face powder, hair spray, perfume or sikn oils must be avoided. And constant contact with hard rough textured fabrics and other jewelry may damage the delicate outer surface of your pearls," he said.



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
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
