"Marty was always up here by himself." Yellen said, waving his hand along an imaginary plateau above his head. "The rest of us were

always down here, fighting it out for second, third and fourth place in the

second, third and routin place in al-rankings."

That has all changed — thanks to Yellen. For the 20-year-old South-field High School graduate has done what no other pro has been able to do — he has beaten Hogan in backto-back tournaments

to-back tournaments.

And he has done it convincingly.
The first win came in the finals in
a non-ranking tournament in Boston
April 13. After Yellen claimed a 2115. 21-11 victory, Hogan said his

No such statement could be made the following week. In a ranking tournament (one that counts towards NRC player ratings) in Atlanta, Yellen again came up with an upset win, this time by 21-15, 19-21,

11-1 scores. Suddenly, the king was in danger of losing his throne.

"THERE'S PRESSURE on him he's never had before," Yellen said of Hogan.
"There's more at stake than before. There are so many things on his mind.

"Now that I've beaten him twice he's feeling it. He's had to work a lot harder than he's head to before."

Still, Hogan is still considered the best in the game, and with good reason. In 35 tournament appearances in four years, the 22-year-old racquethall king has won 30 times. Hogan has exhibited clear superiority in a sport that requires quickness and physical ability and a sound mental approach.


