## consumer mailbag

How can I avoid eating pesticides that may be on the fruits and vegetables I buy? Does water remove them?

Simply washing fruits and vegetables with water is not an effective way of removing pesticide residues. A better way is with a liquid detergent.

For example, water will not remove diazinon (a commonly used insecticide) from peaches, but a diluted kitchen liquid detergent removed 39 percent of this residue.

Although kitchen detergent is more effective than water in removing pesticide residues, care must be taken to remove the detergent by a second washing with clear water.

Removal of outer portions of leafy vegetables also reduces the risk of consuming excessive amounts of pesticides. Outer leaves of such vegetables as cabbage and lettuce have as much as 31 times the amount of residue as the inner leaves.

While both of these methods reduce pesticides in food, strict enforcement of existing laws could result in further reduction of harmful residues in food. To express your concerns, write: Director, Office of Pesticide Programs, U.S. EPA, Washington, D.C. 20460.

We have been taking our glass and cans to the Southfield recycling center, but they are no longer taking cans. Are there any recycling centers that are taking cans anymore?

Unfortunately, the market for flattened tin cans has not increased sufficiently over the years to warrant collection by volunteer recycling centers any longer.

Concern encourages purchasing products packaged in materials that can be recycled easily, such as paper, cardboard, glass and aluminum.

So many of the items that come in by metal cans are available in natural packaging, fresh fruits and vegetables in season are an economical as well as environmental choice.

Solid waste, or garbage, continues to be generated in ever-increasing amounts and at ever-increasing rates. Every American produces more than 1,300 pounds of garbage every year, not counting millions of tons generated by business and industry.

Recycling on an individual basis is helpful but answers to the question of waste disposal must ultimately be handled on a much broader and complete scale. Individuals can help by becoming involved through the public participation process.
