

Harrison advances to Class B district

Farmington, Mercy to meet in softball tourney

Two local softball squads, Farmington High and Farmington Our Lady of Mercy, will clash in the state Class A district tournament on Saturday, May 31, at Farmington's Knights of Columbus Field, Middlebelt between Grand River and Nine Mile.

Both teams won recent pre-district games to advance to Saturday's 12:30 p.m. meeting. Mercy outlasted Walled Lake Central, 14-11, and Farmington battered Milford High, 9-2.

Farmington mound ace Jean Zuborski notched her eighth win against two losses in going the distance against Milford. She allowed eight hits, struck out four and walked four.

Farmington's Mary Long clouted a three-run homer in the first inning to spark her team's five-run outburst in that frame. Long went four for four, and teammate Sue Carruthers had four hits in four trips and drove in two runs. The winners had 15 hits.

The victory boosted Coach Richard Roy's Farmington club to 16-3 overall.

In the other pre-district game, Central scored 10 runs in the first inning, driving starting pitcher Lisa Morris from the game. Mercy coach Linda Barber used Meri Stockwell, who recorded her sixth victory against three losses. She gave up three hits — all singles — and struck out four.

Lori Macdonald had three hits in six trips and drove in two runs for Mercy.

which scored five runs in the fifth. Teammate Carol Somerville went two for four and knocked in five runs. Mercy has a 10-7 overall record.

FARMINGTON HARRISON, advanced to the Class B district on Saturday at Oak Park with a 7-6 win over Dearborn St. Alphonsus.

Harrison's Cynthia Pink, who started on the mound and lasted only 1½ innings, won the game with her bat. She belted a seventh-inning homer to left

center to break a six-all tie. Kathy Purcell and Linda Bache each had two hits in four trips.

Gina Kikka, the winning pitcher, allowed four earned runs on nine hits, struck out none and walked two. She also had a big bat with four hits and two RBIs.

Harrison has a 4-14 overall record under coach Ivor Horvitz.

In another recent game, North Farmington whipped Redford Thurston, 11-1, in the Northwest Suburban League.

Winning pitcher DeAnna Formen, a junior right-hander, allowed four hits, struck out none and walked none. She also smashed a bases-loaded triple in the fifth inning. Teammate Betty Lee, a sophomore, singled in the 11th run in the sixth inning.

Earlier, North dropped a 13-2 decision to Walled Lake Western in a Class A pre-district game. Losing pitcher Cindy Atkins went 1½ innings. Western scored 12 runs in the first two innings.

North Farmington, coached by Sandra Rivers, has a 4-11 record.

Another CC winner — net squad

Thousands of Detroit Catholic Central sports fans have cheered the Shamrocks to state championships in football and basketball over the years. Hundreds have witnessed the baseball and wrestling teams win state titles.

Frank Garlicki is expecting what he considers to be a good crowd — 40 people — to watch his young tennis team compete for the state tennis championship this weekend in Midland.

Garlicki, tennis coach at CC for 10 years, is not bitter that his sport does not rank as high on the prestige ladder as most others at the high school level.

"Tennis is not a major sport, so it doesn't necessarily get the press coverage. It's not that we haven't done something. It's just that we're not as consistent as the other teams (at CC)," said Garlicki.

The Shamrocks have never won a state tennis championship. They have qualified for the finals only three times in a decade, but the last two years in a row.

"This is a team with only one senior, and Garlicki is a man with high hopes. We will probably end up among the

top 10 at the Class A state meet this year and be in a great position for the championship next year," he said.

"Everything fell into place for CC this season. It played right up to expectation," said Garlicki. "There were no pleasant surprises and no unpleasant surprises. Just a good year."

The Shamrocks claimed two singles titles and all three doubles crowns a week and a half ago at the Dearborn regional.

Hans Akan, a junior, was the individual champ at second singles and John McCarthy, also a junior, claimed the title at third singles.

Akan resides in West Bloomfield, McCarthy in Livonia.

Two sophomores — John Schram and Doug Button, combined to win the regional title at first doubles. Schram is a Livonia resident, Button lives in Farmington.

Phil Linson, the only senior on the team, and Tom Turek, a junior brought up from the JV in the middle of the regional tournament, originally won the title at second doubles.

However, the championship was later taken away when the Michigan High School Athletic Association ruled that a

lineup could not be changed once the regional began.

Turek replaced Bob Paul when Paul elected to play in a soccer tournament in Milwaukee rather than in the tennis regional. Garlicki promptly removed Paul from the team in a disciplinary action.

Linson is a Detroit resident, while Turek lives in Redford.

The regional was Turek's only appearance with the varsity all season long. Garlicki said the junior performed brilliantly.

CC's third doubles tandem — John Strong and Paul Koylars, both juniors — won a regional title. Koylars lives in Livonia, Strong in Northville.

Scott Davis, a sophomore from Farmington, plays at first singles and David Kennedy, a junior from Plymouth, is slotted at fourth singles.

Davis, Akan and McCarthy, the top three singles players on the team, are all ranked by the Southeast Michigan Tennis Association.

McCarthy, undefeated this season, is the Shamrocks' best bet to win a state title in Midland, Garlicki believes. "The competition (at third doubles) simply isn't in the league that he (McCarthy) is in," the coach said.

However, both Davis and Akan have proven to be better than McCarthy in intra-team competition. "In our challenge matches, McCarthy constantly ends up number three," said Garlicki.

In spite of Turek's outstanding effort during the regional, Randy Miller, a sophomore from Farmington, will be paired with Linson at second doubles in Midland.

Miller only recently has come back after missing virtually the entire season with a hand injury. "He's playing with only 90 percent feeling, but he's such a strong player to make a recovery this far," said Garlicki.

John Huebel, a sophomore from Dearborn, also has filled in several doubles matches for the Shamrocks this spring. Garlicki said that he emphasizes individual accomplishment when motivating his team. It's not quite the same tactic as firing up a football or basketball squad with the emphasis on teamwork.

"The system I use is for the individual to play for himself. I focus around that, not to play for the school," he said. "You're appealing to a different pride — pride in self representing the school. I try to teach them to think in terms of self."

A Regular Meeting of the Farmington City Council was held on Monday, May 19, 1980, in the Council Chambers, 23600 Liberty Street, Farmington, Michigan. The meeting was called to order at 8:00 p.m. by Mayor William S. Hartsock.

PRESENT: Mayor Hartsock, Councilmen Bennett, Buckler, Tupper, Yoder.

CITY OFFICIALS PRESENT: City Mgr. Deadman, Director Billing, Director Selfert, Attorney Kelly, Clerk Viane.

Minutes of the previous meeting were approved.

Minutes of other boards were received and/or filed.

Request for Variance to sign ordinance from Sweden House Restaurant was tabled.

Permission was granted to the Farmington Plaza Merchants for their Annual Tent Sale during the week of June 23-28, 1980.

Council supported the City of Birmingham in their opposition to HB 4645.

A Proclamation was issued designating the week of May 19-25, 1980.

Council accepted the bid of the Arteria Corporation, Ann Arbor, Michigan, in the amount of \$85,398.75 for a computer system, waiving the bid process as being in the best interest of the city. Council authorized the City Manager and the City Clerk to sign the contract on behalf of the City.

Ordinance No. C-453-80 was introduced which would amend the city's zoning ordinance Chapter 39, Title V, Sections 5.51 through 5.54 RV River Valley District.

Ordinance No. C-456-80 was introduced which would prohibit parking on the south side of Oakland Street, from Grand River to Cass Street.

Council accepted the alternate bid of McCarthy Contracting in the amount of \$103,201.50 for the 1980 Road Improvement Program.

City Mgr. Deadman advised of the new Santa Bus Service to Farmington.

City Manager Deadman advised Council of public hearings scheduled by SEMTA regarding their plans for transportation improvements and proposed plans for property acquisition in the City of Farmington.

Council opposed the proposed acquisition of property at Nine Mile and Farmington Road by SEMTA.

Council will ask the Planning Commission to review the zoning of the property at Farmington Road and Nine Mile Rd.

City Manager Deadman was instructed to contact those people whose terms of office on various boards and commissions are expiring to determine if they wish to be reappointed.

Councilman Buckler was appointed to serve as the Council Representative to the Farmington Youth Assistance.
