

Harrison boys finish 5th in Western Six

It's becoming so common that if Livonia Churchill didn't win the Western Six League Boys' Track championship, it would really be news.

The Chargers claimed their ninth conference championship in a row last week by tallying 169 points at the all-league meet.

Walled Lake Western, which had lost to the Chargers by only a few points in

their dual confrontation, placed a distant second at league with 94 points.

The other four teams were bunched closely. Mott landed third, 66 points, Northville fourth, 57, Farmington Harrison fifth, 53, and Plymouth Canton sixth, 52.

Tom Gosselin, a Churchill senior, became the first person in Western Six

League history to win four events at the conference meet.

Gosselin clocked 10.3 seconds in the 100, 23.2 in the 220 and 51.3 in the 440. He also teamed with Jim Riley, Steve Tracy and Nelson Recla to win the mile relay with a time of 3:24.1.

Pred Price, who has coached Churchill to all nine championships, said he was stunned by not only the margin of

victory, but the first-place finish itself. "On paper, we figured it would take a tremendous effort on our part (to win)," said Price. "I was very much surprised."

"It was just a case of our kids being ready for the field events and the preliminaries."

Churchill scored points in every

event. In fact, the Chargers scored three people in four events — discus, 220-yard hurdles, 160-yard dash and 220-yard dash.

The Chargers started the running portion of the meet with a fury. Gosselin and Recla finished one-two in the 100 and Recla and Jeff Olwezen went one-two in the 120 hurdles.

The Chargers were in command the rest of the way.

Jeff Leake cleared 12-8 in pole vault to account for Churchill's sixth first-place showing of the competition.

Harrison's only win at the league festival came in the 440 relay. Steve Stat-

field, Greg White, Steve Sweeney and John Morton recorded a time of 45.7.

Ken Kopko placed second for the Hawks in the 440, 51.5, Steve Shanborn second in long jump, 20-3/4.

Canton didn't reap any conference titles. Randy Lee, though, was second in pole vault, 12-4.

Kelly Canfield and Steve Sutherland, both from Western, won two events. Canfield hurled the discus 161-0, a new league record, and put the shot 51-11. Sutherland timed 43.8 in the mile, and 3:56.2 in the two mile.

Canfield's record in the discus was the only one set during the meet.

Lakers outkick North—again

No one could blame coach Mike Horner if he seemed a bit downcast Wednesday evening.

Horner, who coaches North Farmington's talented girls' soccer team, had just dropped a 1-0 decision to another good team, West Bloomfield. Earlier this spring, North lost to West Bloomfield by an identical score.

"Our luck is all bad when we play that team," said Horner, whose team closed out its season with a 9-2 record. "It was the same old problem — we couldn't put the ball in the net."

"We hit three posts in that game. We hit the uprights twice and the cross bar once. In our two games against West Bloomfield, we've hit the post seven times without scoring."

West Bloomfield, coached by Diane Smith, climbed to 9-3-1 with the win over North.

"It was an excellent soccer game," Smith said. "You could see a lot of skill in that game. In these games, you sometimes see a lot of hustle and not

much skill. But we're two well-matched teams — both very good." Sue Vodka, a junior center forward, scored the game's only goal. "She was outside the penalty area when she took the shot," Smith said. "She hooked the ball to the opposite corner. It was spinning, so it went through the goalie's hands, through her legs and into the goal."

HORNER USED two goalkeepers, Ann Schans (who allowed the goal) and Janice Higuera. Sara Mammes played in goal for West Bloomfield. Each team took nine shots.

West Bloomfield is on its way to completing an excellent inaugural season in the Eastern Division of the North Suburban Girls' Soccer Association. The Lakers have scored 41 goals, given up just six, and recorded nine shutouts.

In another prep soccer game last week, Laura Holter and Miltie Richardson each scored a goal to lead Farmington High past Livonia Franklin, 2-1, in the association's Western Di-

vision. Holly Brda scored Franklin's goal.

Livonia Bentley outkicked Farmington's Harrison, 3-1, in another Western Division game. Harrison finished with

a 3-8-3 record. Bonnie Brandth, Kelly Ingram and Linda Wiselock each scored a goal for Bentley. Eileen Whittemore scored Harrison's goal.
