New office complex planned for area

Two new office complexes will be permitted on Orchard Lake Road in West Bloomfield.

Plans for a three-story office building nearly settled last year in a rezoning decision won approval from the planning commission last west.

Jared Schubiner, president of Elliot Travel, expects to be the main tenant of the building on 3.25 acres across from the Becfacryer restaurant and the Orchard Mall.

The commission approved Architect

The commission approved Architect
Sanford Rossen's petition 8-0. Commissioner Adam Sobetsky was absent.
Last May, the property was rezoned
from residential to office by the commission. But the Oakland County Coordinating Committee dubbed the change
"too much of an intrustion into residential development."

"too much of an intrustion and reamental development."
Neighboring Pepperhill condominium owners presented petitions asking the township board to deny the rezoning. The site is designated as transitional on the township master plan which would allow multiples or offices.

The original township board vote

The original township board vote was deadlocked 2-2 with Trustees Weldon Yeager and Thoma Law absent. Clerk Betty Sue Dupree abstained.

In a later vote requested by Schubiner with two trustees still absent, Mrs. Dupree joined Supervisor John Doherty and Trustee Raymond Holland in voting for rezoning. Treasurer Marilyn Fessler and Trustee Dennis Vatsis voted againt the change.

LAST WEEK, the plan again brought protests from nearby homeowners. Bernard Rivkin from West Bloomfield Lake Estates subdivision said the meeting should be to consider special use since the township's ordinance does not clearly define roof heights.

The wall waiver, with the exception of one lot, will be considered June 24.
