


Teachers threaten boycott after vandals strike

proposed by principal Graham, was a cancellation of all senior activities.

The second was proposed and passed by the faculty Tuesday before Schulman and Nutter were admitted to the meeting. In that motion, the teachers agreed to boycott all student activities. Faculty members were to meet with the senior board to present their restitution proposal Wednesday. What the restitution was to be was to be left to the senior board. The faculty is to meet today to outline restitution demands and their next course of action.


Other plans were made to make sure both students and parents know about the vandalism problems well in advance of graduation time.


