### State reps face primary contests

The 61st district in northeast Oak-land County drew the most interest as candidates filed last week for the Aug. 5 state representative primary races. Five of the seven state representa-tive districts in the Observer & Eccen-tric area will have primary contests. Three incumbents are being challenged in their parties "primaries"

IN THE 61st district, which includes Oakland Township, first-term incum-bent Democrat Alice Tomboulian faces two Democratic and six Republican

Other Democrats in the race are Robert Singleton Jr. of Pontlac and Joseph E. Smalley of Oxford.

The state Republican Party has targeted the 61st district, which was held for three terms by current state GOP Chairman Mel Larsen.

Republican hopefuls include Oakland County Commissioner Mat J. Dunaskiss of Lake Orion, Stanley M. Brown of Pontlac, Thomas S. Barlow Jr. of Oxford, Gary L. Prints of Pontlac, Doug Island, Prints of Oxford and Kenneth R. Griffith of Auburn Heights.

Paul Calvin Peterson, of Birmingham, was the only Democrat to file.
A three-way Republican race in the 64th District (Farmington, Farmington Hills and part of Southfield) will pt incumbent Wilbur V. Brotherton against John M. Mulroy and Joseph Schmidt, both of Southfield. The sole Democratic candidate is Karen Artinian of Southfield.

#### Congressional hopefuls line up for August battle

Primary races Aug. 5 are assured in all but one U.S. congressional district in southern Oakland and western

withdrawal deadline was Friday atter-noon.

In the 18th District, which includes all of Troy, incumbent U.S. Rep, James Blanchard of Pleasant Ridge has no Democratic primary opponent. Chal-lenger Betty Suida of Royal Oak is the sole Republican candidate. In the 19th District, which includes the bulk of Oakland County, three Dem-ocrats will be on the August ballot — the Rev. Leroy J. Peterson of Birming-ham, Wayne E. Daniels of Union Lake and James M. Pidgeon of Bloomfield Hills. The winner will face Rep. Wil-liam Broomfield, R-Birmingham, run-ning for a 18th term.

IN THE 17TH District (the Farmington area, Southfield, Redford Township and northwest Detroit), incumbent Democrat William M. Brodhead of De-Democrat William M. Broonead of De-troit has no primary opponent. Repub-lican challengers are Arve Bakken of Redford Township and Raymond Co-

lican challengers are Arve Bakken of Reddord Township and Raymond Co-chran of Detroit.
Two-term incumbent Rep. David Bonior of Mt. Clemens has three Demo-cratic opponents for his 12th District seat. The predominantly Macomb County district includes the eastern half of Avon Township and the city of Rochester.

### **County board race** loses 4-term veteran

Commissioner Henry W. Hoot dropped his re-election bid for a fifth-tern on the Oskland County board. Citing "business demands" and two "strong Republican candidates," Hoot, a conservative Republican from the Montheld Township, withdrew his name from the Aug. 5 primary election ballot.

HOOT, A self-employed radio broad-casting consultant, said his new busi-ness was "demanding more and more of my time." He said his work often took him out of the state.

During his nearly eight years on the Board of Commissioners, Hoot gained a reputation of being the most consistent-ly conservative Republican. He often differed with his more moderate Re-publican colleagues on county spend-

ing, support of the county executive's powers, support of such regional agencies as SEMTA and SEMCOG and other

cies as SEMTA and SEMTA on an ounce issues.
Hoot said Friday he went "back and forth for a couple of days" on dropping out. "I finally made up my mind this morning," he said.
But after November, the Board of Commissioners may yet have another Hoot. Edward W. Hoot, Henry's father, is a Republican candidate for 3rd District commissioner, a seat being vacated by state representative candidate Matt Dunaskiss, of Lake Orion.

THE ONLY other county commissioner candidate to withdraw Friday was Robert Gariepy, of Southfield, who filed for the Republican ballot in the 15th District (parts of Bloomfield Township, Southfield and Farmington Hills)

His action leaves incumbent Lillian Moffitt, R-Bloomfield, unopposed in the August primary. Mrs. Moffitt, vice chairwoman of the Board of Commischairwoman of the Board of Commis-sioners, will face Democrat Barbara Kukes Goldman of Bloomfield Town-ship in the Nov. 4 general election.
