GEORGE F. BOOS

Former Detroit Police Commissioner George Boos, 83, of Southfield died May 29. Services were in the Bell Chapel of the William R. Hamilton Funeral Home. Burial was in Roseland

Park Cemetery.

Mr. Boos joined the Secret Service after serving in World War I. He served as bodyguard for the King of Siam and several U.S. presidents, including Calvin Coolidge, Herbert Hoover, Franklin Roosevelt and Harry Truman. He was appointed Detroit police commissioner in 1952 by the late Mayor Albert Cobo and served until October 1952.

He is survived by his wife, Loretta, of Southfield; sons, Richard and Warren, both of Orchard Lake; brothers, William of Lansing and Robert, an employee of the Central Intelligence Agency; sister, Mrs. Betty Burkhardt of Fort Worth, Fla.; and seven grandchildren.

Edward H. Honos, a teacher at Detroit Country Day School and a resident of West Bloomfield, died June 2 at Henry Ford Hospital.

The 37-year-old science teacher had arrived at Detroit Country Day at 8:30 a.m. that day to monitor his final examination in chemistry. He became seriously ill shortly after. The faculty and student body, seeing him in apparent good health, were left stunned and grieving upon learning of his death from a heart attack a few hours later.

Dr. Richard Schlegel, president-headmaster of Detroit Country Day, described him as "a very dedicated teacher who had a natural rapport with students and their problems. He is well-known throughout the country for the science projects of his students and his teaching ability. I, my fellow teachers and administrators will deeply miss Ed — personally and professionally."

Honos was particularly interested in

working with gifted students. He wrote a textbook for an honors eighth-grade chemistry course, which the school has used for three years. His high school students won many local, regional and national science prizes.

HE WAS recently returned from Minneapolis-St. Paul after accompanying a student winner of the Detroit Metropolitan Science Fair to the International Science Fair.

"Mr. Honos" said one Country Day student, "was demanding and severe on the outside, but soft and compassionate at the center." Fellow faculty members described him as "brilliant," a man who had a total and comprehensive grasp of his subject matter."

One of his goals was to establish himself as a scientific writer to interpret the emerging scientific discoveries for the general public. In an interview, he once said, "We need to raise the scientific literacy whenever and whenever we can."

Honos tried to accomplish this objective, say those who knew him. He had published articles in "Life Sciences" and "Contemporary Neurology," lectured on hydroponics, was a member of the American Chemistry Society and Phi Lambda Upsilon Honorary Chemistry Society. He was also a player-coach in the Lakeland Hockey Association.

Surviving are his wife, Karen, a teacher at Reeper City and Country Schools; sons, John and Edward; daughter, Lara; mother, Mrs. Ann Honos; and brother, John.
