

Families are needed to host French boys

Area families are needed to host French boys who want to spend the month of July experiencing American style living.

The North Atlantic Cultural Exchange League (NACEL) is bringing more than 3,000 French students to this country to live with American families this year.

Ninety of these boys will come to Michigan and host families are needed immediately for them. "We have had a good response from area families who want to host," said Evelyn Prince, she and her husband, Julian, are area coordinators for NACEL.

However, a large proportion of our families have requested girls. French boys are also interested in coming here to learn about our language and lifestyle.

"Many boys realize that a visit can help to prepare them for the adult world of business, where they will probably come into contact with Ameri-

cans and other English speaking people."

The students have had four to eight years of English language study. Their parents supply them with pocket money and pay for their transportation and insurance.

Mrs. Prince said families do not have to have a teenager at home or speak French.

"But we do ask them to introduce their guests to teenagers," she said. "We want the students to meet Americans near their own age."

Program organizers will match the students with prospective families according to general interests and special activities they would like to participate in.

In the reciprocal program, the teenagers from host families will be offered the chance to spend four weeks with a French family.

Television adds to pastoral care

A closed circuit color television system based in the Providence Hospital Chapel has added a dimension to the hospital's pastoral care services.

The TV equipment was provided by a gift from retired businessman Sheldon Hayes to the Providence Hospital Foundation.

All patients are now able to share in the celebration of daily Mass and seasonal interfaith services in the chapel by tuning to Channel 5 on the TV sets in their rooms.

In addition, the system is in operation 24 hours a day with the camera focused on the sanctuary to help provide a sense of spiritual presence for pa-

tients wishing to pray.

"Few of our patients are able to go to the chapel, so the television capabilities represent a very meaningful extension of our resources to meet the spiritual needs of patients of all faiths," said Sister Jane Burger, director of pastoral care.

The first telecasts took place during Holy Week and included the Protestant communion service, Holy Thursday mass and the Good Friday concert by the Providence Gospel Choir.

The pastoral care department is developing plans to expand the video program with a wide range of spiritual and religious offerings.
