

Educational field trips planned for children

Students from third through seventh grade will have an opportunity to participate in six field trips throughout the summer.
Cost is \$25 for the series.
Students will be provided transportation, preparation and discussion for each visitation.

Separate points of interest are developed for third and fourth graders and others for fifth through seventh graders.
Registration will be at Middlebelt School, 24400 Middlebelt on June 18, 19 and from 8 a.m. to noon and 1-3 p.m.
Trips for third and fourth graders are scheduled for Wednesday afternoons. The remainder are scheduled for Thursday afternoons.
Charges required for any field trip will be added to the registration fee. Registration fees are non-refundable after the first class.

Trips for third and fourth graders are as follows:
-JUNE 25 — DETROIT SCIENCE CENTER. Includes tour of exhibition theater; presentation in space theater of "Atmos" film which examines the forces of determining the world's weather; special presentation of light which explores the nature of light through the use of laser, a wave machine and solar cells. Admission is \$2.50. Bus departs at noon and returns approximately 4:15 p.m.
-JULY 2 — ELIAS BROTHER FOOD PREPARATION CENTER. A behind the scenes view of preparation rooms, meat cutting and grinding, vegetable preparation, soups and sauces, bakery, cooler and freezer. Bus departs at noon and returns approximately 3:15 p.m.
-JULY 9 — FISHER BODY TRIM PLANT. Students will see final assembly of all interior trim on Fisher Body cars. Bus departs at 12:15 p.m. and returns at 3:15 p.m.
-JULY 16 — HAVEN HILL NA-

TURE CENTER. Students will experience a pond study; its changes and its effects on the wildlife, forest and man. After collecting pond life, microscopes will be used to view findings. If time permits, there will be a tour through the habitarium or nature trails. Students are required to wear long-sleeved shirts and slacks. Insect repellent is advised. Bus departs at noon and returns at 4:15 p.m.
-JULY 23 — DOSSIN GREAT LAKES MUSEUM. Trip also includes the harbormaster division of the Detroit Police Department. Students will view models of all Great Lakes ships, listen to a ship-shore radio and use a submarine periscope. The routine of the Harbormaster will be explained as well as a demonstration of how equipment is used for rescue missions. Bus departs at 12:15 p.m. and returns at 4:14 p.m.
-JULY 30 — DETROIT FIRE DEPARTMENT. A tour of the largest fire station in Detroit. Students will meet captain and officer in charge and see

special fire truck for fighting boat fires on Detroit river, 100 foot ladder truck for quelling tall building fires. Students will observe how a call is received and routine for handling calls.
Included in the trip is a tour of the National Bank of Detroit money museum. Students will gain insight into the history, geography, art and economics of money. If time permits, there will be a sbbrt tour of the Renaissance Center. Bus departs at noon and returns at 4:14 p.m.
Thursday trips for students in fifth through seventh grade will be:
-JUNE 26 — HAVEN HILL NATURE CENTER. Same activities as described for third and fourth graders above.
-JULY 3 — HENRY FORD'S COLLECTION OF POLITICAL MEMORABILIA. Students will be a collection of political memorabilia dating back to the Adams-Jackson campaign of 1824. Also, there will be a tour through Henry Ford's personal collection. Bus departs at 12:15 p.m. and returns at 3:45 p.m.

-JULY 10 — FORD NUCLEAR REACTOR. Facilities for nuclear energy research and teaching will be observed at the Phoenix Memorial laboratory at the University of Michigan. Bus departs at noon and returns at 3:45 p.m.
-OAKLAND COUNTY SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT. Films and slides will be shown of department's aircraft, dogs, special types of law enforcement operations. There also will be a tour through the jail and other facilities. A time will be set aside for questions and answers. Bus departs at noon and returns at 3:45 p.m.
-JULY 24 — UNIVERSITY OF MICHIGAN ART MUSEUM. A special guided tour through the museum. Bus departs at 12:15 p.m. and returns at 4 p.m.
-JULY 31 — PONTIAC SILVER-DOME. Tour includes visiting the team locker room, special suites and the field. Bus departs at 12:30 p.m. and returns at 3:30 p.m.
