### Communication breakdown steams coach

A constant drizzle Saturday washed out the state Class B high school basebal finals at Lansing's Municipal Park.

Three of the final four teams — Farmington Harrison, Plint Power and Mr. Pleasant — were notified that morning and stand how. But Ron Engels, codeh of the Wyomig Park baseball team, sure wishes someone had told him about the rainout.

Wyoming Park, the tournament favorite with a 22-6 record, was to have played Mt. Pleasant at 10 a.m. Saturday. Harrison was to have played Powers at noon.

The same teams will play at the same times at the same place on Monday. The Class B final is set for 3:30 p.m.

Wyoming Park finally received official notification that Saturday's games were cancelled by calling Don Little, tournament director and

WYOMING PARK Athletic Di-rector Jack VanDuin had made an earlier call to Vern Norris, the exec-utive director of the Michigan High School Athletic Association, to get Little's phone number. "Somebody is giving somebody the runaround here," VanDuin told Norris on the phone. "We just get the feeling that somebody is cover-ing up for this Don Little."

VanDuin said Little claimed to have called Engels' home early that moraling. "He made one attempt to call our coach," VanDuin said. "He said no

coacn, 'vanDun sain. 'He sain no, one answered.''

Engels' wife, Sally, said she was at home at the time when Little was supposed to have called, and that there was no phone call.

Meanwhile, Wyoming Park's fans

were left standing in the rain.

"I'd advise that Don Little not to come around because we have a

hostile mob here," said a fan. "He might get his lights punched out." Joked another fan, "I saw. a rope in someone's back seat." Municipal Park is on Kalamazoo Street one block east of U.S. 27 on Lansing's east side.

Fans driving up from Farmington should take I-96 to the U.S. 127 exit and follow highway 127 north to Kalamazoo Street and turn right.

#### A close finish in Michigan Mile

### Filly puts best nose forward

A 4-year-old Canadian filly showed little respect for the Fa-ther's-Day spirit Sunday at the De-troit Race Course. Glorious Song, the second most-

popular choice of wagering patrons for the \$100,000-added Michigan Mile, edged Prince Majestic by a nose to win the state's richest thor-

nose to win the state's richest thor-oughbred race of the year. Ridden by John LeBlanc, Glorious

Song broke out of the starting gate well and led the seven-horse field an eighth of a mile into the race.

Prince Majestic, however, took the lead rounding the first turn and held on all the way into the final turn that the start of the way into the final turn that the start of the way has the start of the start of

Majestic finished second to Sensitive Prince in the 1979 Michigan Mile and a much closer second yesterday to Glorious Song.

The winning time was 150.

Uncool placed third, four lengths behind Prince Majestic.

Overskate, the heavy betting favorite, never really challenged during the mile-and-an-elighth race. Another Canadian entry, Overskate ran dead last until he made him over the move with a half mile remaining. Overskate eventually placed fourth—the highest position he ever attained during the course of the Mile. Even though it rained steadily throughout the afternoon, the track was rated fast for most of the evening's program, including the Mile. LeBlanc said that Glorious Song was not affected by the lateness of

the race — it didn't get off until 19:35 pm.—the lights or the cool, dam weather — 50 degrees.

Glorious Song became only the third filly or mare in the 32-year history of the Mile to win the event. The others were My Juliet in 1972.

Bud Sears, director of racing at DRC, announced to the crowd when presenting the championship trophy to Glorious Song's owners, "You have probably seen the greatest filly on the North American continent."

Overskate, which had placed first in all four of his previous outings this year, couldn't say nay to that.

The largest crowd of the DRC meeting to date — 10,795 — turned out to watch the program. The total wagering pool for the Mile was \$115,374.

Bettors who selected Glorious Song were returned \$8.20, \$4 and \$5.40.
