Rice, Cranbrook produce tennis standouts

FOLLOWING IN Nagel's footsteps is 17-year-old junior CHIP BAGLEY from Andover. A two-time regional champion at Lathrup, Bagley was seeded No. 2 in the state meet and also advanced to the semifinals of the other bracket before falling.
This is the second straight season

Bagley, the league runner-up to Nagel, has been on the OAE All-Area squad. Leading Rice's contingent is the Warriors' No. 1 singles player BILL HARAHAN. Harahan, a senior, is a two-time All-Area selection. He lost to Nagel in the regional finals and fell in the state quarterfinals to Appleton. He was the hub of Rice's singles play-

ers. Harahan's teammates CHARLIE DUNN and PAUL DYLEWSKI, playing No. 1 doubles, were chosen as one of the two All-Area doubles teams. The Warriors thrived on the play of their doubles teams all year long, and Dunn and Dylewski were always in the spotlight.

This duo won the regional title over Seaborn's fine team of Phil Van Winkle and Brad Fishman, 4-6, 7-6, 6-1. They lost in the state semifinals to Port Huron Northern's Ogie Jones and John Jones.

Cranbrook landed three singles players on this team led by No. 1 player JON ETTERBEEK. Etterbeek, a No. 4 singles player last year, is making his first appearance on the honor squad. He was a regional champion with a straight-set victory over Mike Woody of Clawson, 6-3, 6-4. The junior netter was the only Cranbrook player to not win in the state meet, but he advanced to the final round before losing.

Two other Cranbrook teammates, PAT SHIELDS and BRAD WAYBURN, both juniors as well, battled for the No. 2 and No. 3 singles positions all season. Shields makes the All-Area team with his No. 2 singles regional victory over highly-regarded Mike Potter of Troy. He was a straight-set winner at the state meet.

Co-captain Wayburn, playing No. 3 singles in state-tourney action, defeated Harrison's outstanding female player, Nancy Green, 6-2, 6-3 for the regional title. He won a split-set decision at the state meet.

Cranbrook landed the other All-Area doubles pick No. 1 players BILL NAU and JEFF TREES. Co-captain Nau, the only senior on Cranbrook's team, and sophomore Trees combined for a sparkling 21-3 record including regional and state championships. Country Day's No. 1 and No. 2 singles players, CARLOS MORAVEK and BRAD GOODMAN, also received All-Area accolades.

No. 1 singles Moravek, only a sophomore, advanced to the finals in the regional and state tournaments before losing. He was the winner of the Country Day and Rochester Adams tournaments.

Goodman, another sophomore, also won the Country Day and Adams events at No. 2 singles. He won the re-

gionals, but lost in the state finals to University-Liggett's Drew Mascarin. Goodman beat Mascarin in the regional finals.

Troy Athens' GEORGE HUANG was the MSA and L'Anse au Loup North Regional champion this year. He lost only two matches all season, but one was by default because of leg cramps. His only real setback was to Nagel in the state quarterfinals, 6-1, 6-0.

Lahser's MARCO LORENZETTI was the Knights top player this season. Competing in the tough MSA, Lorenzetti was second to Huang. He didn't survive the powerful Lathrup Regional. Lorenzetti was an honorable mention All-Area selection last year.

Coach of the Year — ED WAITS, Southfield-Lathrup — A familiar name to the area's tennis circuit, Lathrup's hard-working tennis coach Ed Waits has been named the Coach of the Year in 1980. Waits led his Chargers to an undefeated championship in the MSA and a 10th-place finish in the state meet.

Oakland tennis player wins 2 tournaments

Plymouth's Ken Bloom continues to swing a lethal tennis racket.

The Oakland University standout kept up his stellar play of late by winning the men's singles title at the Schoolcraft College Tennis Tournament held last weekend.

Bloom captured the singles title Monday night in the rain-delayed event at Livonia's Grand Slam Tennis Club with a 6-2, 6-5, 6-0 win over Ron Pink of Redford.

The Plymouth netter also grabbed the men's doubles crown along with Curt Schultz, also a resident of Plymouth.

Bloom and Schultz downed Herb Sistrunk and Al Williams, both from Wyandotte, 6-4, 2-6, 6-3.

A graduate of Plymouth Salem High

School, Bloom ended his fine collegiate career four weeks ago by winning the No. 1 singles crown in the Great Lakes Conference.

At Schoolcraft, Bloom outlasted a field of 65 participants. He and Pink were teammates two years at Henry Ford Community College.

Seeded No. 1, Bloom beat another teammate, Mark Berke of Southfield who plays No. 2 singles at Oakland, 7-5, 3-6, 6-0, in a semifinal match played Sunday outdoors at Schoolcraft.

Pink reached the finals with a 6-3, 6-4 triumph over No. 2 seed Todd Beyer of Wayne, 5-3, 6-4.

Pink, the No. 4 seed in singles, teamed up with Vic Moccia of Livonia to gain the semifinals in men's doubles. They were eliminated by Sistrunk and

Williams, 3-6, 6-4, 6-3.

BLOOM AND SCHULTZ romped to the finals with a 6-1, 6-2 win over Rochester's Kurt Carbonero and John Bruster.

Farmington's Kathy O'Kane outlasted Oak Park's Laura Tatt to win the 20-player women's singles draw, 1-6, 6-1, 7-6. O'Kane, the No. 1 seed, won the third-set tiebreaker, 6-4.

In the semifinals, Tatt downed Donna Hancher of Farmington in a long match, 5-7, 6-1, 7-6. Tatt took the tiebreaker, 5-3.

In the other semifinal, O'Kane beat Bobbie Daniels of West Bloomfield, 6-3, 7-6.

The women's doubles title was captured by Tatt and Sylvia Kazaleh of Livonia. They defeated Hancher and Daniels in the finals, 7-6, 2-6, 7-5, in a match that ended late Sunday night.

Hancher and Daniels gained the finals with a hard-fought, 6-1, 4-6, 6-4 win over Phyllis Nelson of Livonia and Betty Fesko of Detroit.

Tatt and Kazaleh advanced with a 6-4, 6-2 win over Maxi Neugebauer and Fran Denawetz, both from Orchard Lake.

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SOUTHEASTERN MICHIGAN TRANSPORTATION AUTHORITY NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING

Notice is hereby given that a public hearing will be held by the Southeastern Michigan Transportation Authority (SEMTA) in the 13th floor Board Room, First National Building, 650 Woodward Avenue, Detroit, Michigan at 12:00 Noon EDT, Monday, July 7, 1980, for the purpose of considering a project for which financial assistance is being sought under Section 3 of the Urban Mass Transportation Act of 1964, as amended, generally described as follows:

DESCRIPTION OF PROJECT:

1. The project generally consists of the preliminary design of a light rail transit system within the Woodward Avenue corridor from Downtown Detroit to Royal Oak. The design effort is intended to determine how the system might be constructed. To obtain better estimates of the system's cost. To more definitively determine the social environmental and economic impacts associated with the system's construction and subsequent operation. To develop a plan for financing the system's future operations.

2. The equipment will be owned and operated by SEMTA.

3. The estimated project cost is \$24,000,000 80%, of the funding or \$19,800,000 is proposed to be provided by the Federal government. The remaining 20% will be provided by the State of Michigan.

RELOCATION:

No persons, families, or businesses will be displaced by this project.

ENVIRONMENT:

This project will not have an adverse effect on the environment.

COMPREHENSIVE PLANNING:

This project is in conformance with comprehensive land use and transportation planning in this area.

ELDERLY AND HANDICAPPED:

The system will be designed to accommodate the elderly and handicapped in accord with applicable federal and state regulations.

At the hearing, Semta will afford an opportunity for interested persons or agencies to be heard with respect to the social, economic and environmental impact of the project. Interested persons may submit orally or in writing evidence and recommendations with respect to said project. A copy of the application for a Federal Grant for the proposed project will be available for public inspection here and at SEMTA's office.
