Reported cases of malaria are on the rise

The International Association for Medical Assistance to Travelers (IAMAT) warns that malaria is increasing among travelers to certain high-risk countries.

This warning is backed up by the World Health Organization, which has noted a dramatic increase in the number of malaria cases reported in the United States and Canada.

IAMAT, a non-profit organization which offers medical information and a list of recommended doctors world-wide, makes the following state-

ment:
"With so many of us tripping off to the more exotic tropical destinations, the chances of contracting malaria are growing. Over 5 million Americans and Canadians traveled to the high-risk malaria countries last year. The result was a rise of 46 percent in cases reported in the U.S. and a startling 60 percent rise in those reported in Canada. The United Kingdom reported a 25 percent rise in reported cases resulting in 16 deaths."



The World Malaria Risk Chart, which is available from IAMAT, shows the high risk areas to be in Central America, northern South America, central and southern Africa, the Middle East, India and

and southern Atrica, the Middle East, India and southeast Asia. A pamphlet, "How to Protect Yourself Against Malaria," describes the nature of the disease and the preventive measures that can be taken by travelers visiting these areas. They recommend that you book your trip through a travel agent with a window sign that reads Alliance of Travel Agencies for Traveler Protection Against Malaria. They also

recommend that you ask your doctor for a preventive medicine called Chloroquine.

APPARENTLY malaria is different from other APPARENTLY malaria is different from other dangerous diseases in that it can usually be prevented by taking medication before, during and after exposure. Local inhabitants may be immune to malaria, but they still may carry the disease in their blood. A mosquite that bites such a person can carry the malaria to an unsuspecting traveler. A resurgence of malaria in developing countries is also attributed to a growing resistance by the

carrier mosquito to insecticides. Health officials also blame ignorance on the part of travelers and the tendency of national tourist bureaus to play down the incidence of malarlia.

I do not intend to alarm you with this informa-tion. I am not a doctor, I cannot evaluate the re-ports coming out of the medical community.

I can tell you, however, that concern has been expressed by the World Health Organization, city health departments, the Center for Disease Control in Atlanta and IAMAT. It has been reported in The New York Times and the Toronto Star among other publications. ARKANSAS - We are heading north from Little Rock towards Greer's Fer-ry Lake and the Ozark Folk Center at Mountain View. The Ozark Mountains range across the north and west of Ar-

hot springs.

Corp lakes are those created by the
Corp of Engineers for flood control,
power and recreation. Greer's Ferry

Lake, 1½-hour drive north of Little-Rock, is 40,000 acres of dammed-up water in the hilly, treed country near the town of Heber Springs.

The dam, which was created to hold back the. Red River, one of the prime troot trivers in Arkansas, was dedicated by President John Kennedy a few weeks before his death.

The project killed some of the fish in the area, but it still contains plenty of bass, bream, crappie and catlish, and has been stocked with trout and wallege.

The Red River is liberally dotted with fishing resorts between the dam and Little Rock. They are cottage-style resorts that provide fishing guides and often cance services. The Red is one of Arkanasa' best float streams.

The shores of the lake are devoted to nature trails, campaites and developing tourist resorts, all run with gentle guidence from the Corp of Engineers. The corp has introduced solar energy into some of its camping buildings, and will pioneer new energy conservation techniques here next year.
