## Minding the store come July?

### First-timers

They will be new faces at a Republican National Convention, but they are experienced campaigners in the 19th Congressional District.

Joseph Knollenberg of Birmingham and Ellen T. Templin of Bloomfield Township will be Bush delegates when they attend a national convention for the first time July 14-18 in Detroit.

Knollenberg is Oakland County GOP chairman, and Mrs. Templin was heavily involved in the Bush campaign. Picked as a Reagan delegate was L. Catherine Wolters of Waterford Township.

Alternates will be John Calandro of Northville and JoAnn Van Tassel of Lake Orion, both for Bush, and Joseph Ellis, Brighton, for Reagan.

"I was sitting next to a woman at a newcomers' luncheon in 1958 — we had just moved here from Ohio — and she said, 'How'd you like to work for the Republican Party?'" Mrs. Templin recalled.

"And I said, 'That would be great!'" In the campaign leading to the May 20 presidential primary, Mrs. Templin, co-chair of the Bush campaign in the 19th, did so much recruiting "that I thought I'd have to have the telephone surgically removed from my ear."

The homemaker's efforts paid off. Not only did former diplomat George Bush carry the area by a 2-1 margin, but the pro-Bush candidates for precinct delegate won every contested race.

"THE FINAL lineup, she said, was 61 for Bush, 51 for Ronald Reagan and 13 for John B. Anderson. She added, "Had the 50 run who said they would file for Bush and failed, we would have done even better."

It was the voters' decree that Michigan's national convention delegation would be 2-1 for Bush. But control of party machinery was up to precinct delegates. The fact that the 19th Con-

gressional District machinery was so pro-Bush helped make a difference when Ranny Riecker was re-elected national committeewoman over Reaganite Nancy Gadola by fewer than 200 votes. The 19th voted 115 for Riecker and 46 for Gadola.

While Mrs. Templin knows Reagan is assured the presidential nomination, other decisions are to be made at the national convention. "I want to be sure support for the Equal Rights Amendment stays in the platform," she said, "and we don't need a constitutional convention to prohibit abortion."

She was recently co-chair of the Michigan Republican Women's Task Force, chair of the campaign committee of the Republican State Committee and coordinator of motor pool volunteers for the Civic Host Committee.

Mrs. Templin defeated Eleanor Blum, a 1976 alternate and teacher from West Bloomfield Township. Knollenberg was elected without opposition.

KNOLLENBERG, a salesman for Allstate Insurance, began his political career in Southfield 10 years ago.

"I had been active in working for city park bond issues, and had always had a bent for politics. But frankly, for a great number of years at the voting booth, I was non-partisan," he said.

"By 1970 I began to lean Republican, and in 1972 I became a precinct delegate. I helped put together a Republican Club in Southfield-Lathrup, to keep people interested in non-election years."

Next he was the party's city director in Southfield. In time, the native Mattoon, Ill., moved to Birmingham and worked his way up to campaign chairman in 1978 and then to county chairman next year.

"I've never run for elective office, and I'm probably not inclined, though I wouldn't rule it out. I get more kick out of the organizational end. It's the nicest part of politics," Knollenberg said.

### Familiar faces

The at-large delegate list for next month's Republican National Convention in Detroit reads like a "Who's Who" of Michigan Republicans.

The 25 at-large delegates were selected at the state GOP convention in the Pontiac Silverdome.

Leading the 15 delegates pledged to former diplomat George Bush is Gov. William Milliken, Bush state campaign head Lore M. Ruppe, former Gov. George Romney of Bloomfield Hills and U.S. Rep. Carl Pursell of Plymouth.

Heading the 10 at-large Ronald Reagan delegates are the former California governor's state campaign chief, John Gnaul of Bloomfield Hills; Robert J. Chambers, a Bloomfield Hills businessman; Max M. Fisher, Franklin financier, and former U.S. Sen. Robert Griffin of Traverse City.

ALSO AMONG the Reagan delegates is Halina Frizzelle, a Farmington Hills homemaker.

State GOP Chairman Mel Larsen of Oxford was elected a Bush delegate as was William McLaughlin of Northville, state Commerce Department director.

Saul Anuzis, Detroit, who is student government president at University of Michigan-Dearborn, will also attend the convention as a Bush delegate.

Farmington Hills Attorney Harriet Rotter was elected an alternate Bush delegate, while Robert H. Fredericks of Troy, chief deputy drain commissioner for Oakland County, will be a Reagan alternate.

### Party line?

A Ronald Reagan-George Bush Republican ticket this fall?

Rhys Lewis, who chaired Bush's presidential effort in the 17th Congressional District (including Southfield, the Farmington area, Redford Township and northwest Detroit), "can't understand how it won't happen."

The Redford Township resident, elected a Bush national convention delegate from the 17th, says Reagan, sure to be the GOP presidential nominee, needs Bush to win such industrial, blue-collar states as Michigan and Pennsylvania.

Active in the Republican Party since 1956, Lewis, 55, is a plant manager. This will be his first convention as a delegate.

LEWIS SAID, "I see no problems" supporting Reagan's presidential bid. But the other Bush delegate, Shirley Stadler of Farmington Hills, said she "wants to review what Mr. Reagan's stands are."

Mrs. Stadler, active in Farmington area civic affairs, wants to see moderate Republicans "have adequate representation in (convention) platform discussions."

She expects a "strong push" to influence GOP positions from anti-abortion groups. Abortion foes want a constitutional amendment banning federally funded abortions, a position Reagan has said he'll support.

"I don't think that's the way to handle it," said Mrs. Stadler, who also is at odds with Reagan over the Equal Rights Amendment.

REAGAN DELEGATE Joseph Burdzinski, Southfield, "can't see how Carter will be elected again" next fall. A Reagan alternate in 1976, Burdzinski, 26, an Oakland Community College lab technician, is the sole Reagan delegate from the 17th District.

Referring to Michigan's Bush-dominated delegation, he said, "We'll all unite (behind Reagan). No question; it takes awhile."

He doesn't see the mostly moderate Bush supporters preferring Illinois Republican Congressman John Anderson in his independent bid for the White House.

Bush supporter Lewis said, "Any Anderson success would have to be generated by the press."

ELECTED ALTERNATE delegates from the 17th District were Charlotte Buchanan of Redford Township for Reagan, and Richard Keier of Southfield and Norma Henderson of Farmington Hills for Bush.

Keier, 40, an active Republican for nearly 20 years, said Reagan can win this fall "if he selects a strong running mate."

"I can't emphasize that strongly enough," he said. Keier thinks Bush "is interested" in the second spot.

"People in Michigan would certainly like to see it," said Keier, a Prudential insurance agent.

Charlotte Buchanan, a retired school teacher, said she has been working for Reagan since his unsuccessful try for the GOP nomination four years ago. She was also an alternate to that convention.

"I expect him to be president," she said. "I have no doubt in my mind."

"Last time, all the Democrats we talked to said, 'If you get your Reagan in, we'll vote for him, but we won't vote for (former President Gerald) Ford.'"

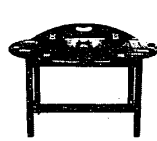
