Housing starts dip 23% in 1979

Residential building permits is-sued last year in the seven-county southeast Michigan area dropped nearly 23 percent from 1978. A recently issued Southeast Mich-igan Council of Governments (SEM-COG) report shows that among the larger growing cities and townships of the late 1970s, only Farmington thills issued more single and multi-

ple family building permits last year (1,622) than in 1978 (1,552). "It wasn't a great year (for new housing starts)," said SEMCOG rep-resentative James Thomas.

HOUSING GROWTH slowed con-

Last year, the western Wayne County township authorized 721 residential units, a decline of 69 percent.

Permits issued last year by Wayne County communities other than Detroit were down 23 percent. Detroit issued 162 more permits last year than in 1978. Demoiltion permits issued by Detroit decreased nearly 28 percent last year from 6,153 in 1978 to 4,438.

FOR THE tri-county (Oakland, Wayne, Macomb) area, building per-mits were down 21 percent last

Nearly 15,400 new single, two-family and multi-family housing starts were approved in the three counties in 1978. That figure dropped to just over 12,000 last year.
The peak housing year during the past 20 years was 1971, when more than 32,000 permits were issued in the three counties.

Three years later, with the advent of the 1974-75 economic recession, housing permits issued in the three counties plummeted 19 5,49.
SEMCOG is a voluntary association of governmental units in Livingston, Macomb, Monroe, Oakland, St. Clair, Washtenaw and Wayne counties.

It proposes regionwide plans and policies in housing and community development, transportation, land use, water and air quality and other environmental areas.

Its plans are subject to approval of local elected officials from member communities.

Michigan trails in retail trade

In what may come as no surprise to Michigan residents, the state ranks first in new car registrations per capita—and most of those cars are American made.

But while residents may buy a lot of new cars, the overall gain in retail trade lags behind the rest of the nation, according to David I. Verway, a research professor in the Graduate School of Business Administration at Michigan State University.

Statistics compiled by the Census of Retail Trade show that the state's restall stade greep by 55 mel state the center of 1972 and 1977. Jagging behind the nalional average of 58 percent. According to Verway, grocery store sales in the state increased by 39 percent during that five-year period, much below the national average of 58 percent, and that's the main reason overall

Smaller families, particularly those without children who eat out in restaurants, and fewer people stocking provisions at their summer cottages has hurt grocery store sales in the state, said Verway.

Places to eat are more common than any other type of retail establishment, both in Michigan and nationwide, according to Verway. In 1977, estaing establishments in the state employed alore intensive, they accounted for only 7 percent of the retail sales in the state. He was a state of the state of

Michigan's Interest in buying Ameri-can-made cars is seen in several other statistics, said Verway. For one, the state ranked 24nd in registrations for new imported cars. In addition, the Bu-reau of Labor Statistics reports that vehicle purchases accounted for 8.9 percent of a Detroit Household's total expenditures, compared with 7.4 per-cent for urban households in the nation as a whole.

And sales of used cars in the state were depressed compared with sales in other states. High saleries and lower new car prices are the reason, Verway

said. Within the state, retail sales in the central business districts in Muskegon, East Lansing, Ann Arbor and Battle Creek, showed increases in sales between 1972 and 1977. Figures were not available for 1972 in Pontiac and Kalamazoo.

Grand Rapids and Bay City grew lit-tle during those five years, while those in Lansing and Jackson declined some-what. And those in Flint and Detroit declin-ed sharply.



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
