The group, with 56,000 members in the U.S., is part of the largest women's Zionist organization in the world, with membership in 12 western countries.

It supports a vast network of social

services and vocational and educational programs aimed to elevate the quality of life in Israel. In the U.S. it encourages community participation for enlightened social legislation and in civic and American-Jewish affairs.

Mother's Day extended into a special weekend for Edith Greenman Starkey of Kalamazoo because five of her children arranged a family reunion dinner in honor of her 82nd birthday in Botsford Inn.

The John Greenman family moved to Farmington in 1924 when they established a landscape architect service here with the Aldrich Nursery.

"Success seemed just around the corner when the flu epidemic of 1929 swept through Farmington taking many, including John," said Ruth Greenman Powell, who is now a resi-

dent of Sparta. Edith Greenman was left with five children, all under 10 years of age.

"Unusual courage and help of church and neighbors saw them through the depression years," Mrs. Powell said. "All graduated from Farmington schools. Then each one followed the oldest to Moody Bible Institute and further education to their chosen careers."

"Many in the Farmington area know of Robert (Greenman) and his wife Lois who have served as missionaries to Argentina. And three of their four children have prepared for Christian service."

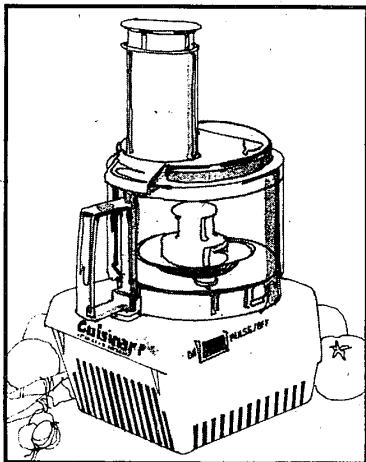
