ment will be able to purchase a \$10 monthly pass which will allow them to ride any SEMTA regular bus service for half fare during the hours listed, during the month for which the card is

purchased.
THE PROGRAM will remain in effect through December 31, 1980. If it proves successful, it may become part of ongoing SEMTA operations.

The passes will be issued by munici-palities or other approved agencies in the SEMTA service area. Each munici-pality will have the option of deciding whether it wishes to participate.

SEMTA will sell the passes for \$10 each — the fee is to help offset the loss in revenue which will result from the reduction of fares — to each municipality wishing to participate.
