Dinner theater is top-heavy with talent in Farmington

Five area residents, four of them members of Farmington Players, are in rehearsals now for "Six Rms Riv Vu," set to open Friday, June 27, in Detroit's Paradise Cafe Dinner Theater, Woodward north of Six Mile.

Having that many actors from one suburban area cast in the same play is "something of a phenomenon," said Nancy Gurwin, who is in the throes of opening her 10th dinner theater production.

It is particularly so in that since there are only eight members in the cast and the company can expect anywhere from 50-100 actors to show up for an audition, no matter what size the cast.

Watching Barbara Lynn Bean and John Powers, the two leads in rehearsals this week, Ms. Gurwin said "they are two strong actors. Well, they have to be. They're on stage continually from the beginning to the end of the show."

The two are backed by the performances of Sandy Ditttrich, Ed Keller and Erik Carlson, all of whom have been seen on stage in Farmington Players Barn.

POWERS HAS been in and out of major production rehearsals steadily since launching his theatrical career in 1971 from Marygrove-University of Detroit.

He has appeared at the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C., the Monomoy Theater in Chatham, Mass., the Oldenberg Playhouse in South Bend, Ind., and Somerset Dinner Theater in Troy.

His most recent role for the players here was in "Prisoner of Second Avenue."

When he winds up his role as Paul Friedman in "Six Rms Riv Vu," after its eight-week summer run at the Paradise, he'll be directing "The Runner Stumbles," the story of a murder in northern Michigan for Farmington Players.

Work with his father in Powers Plastics in Farmington is juggled between singing, dancing, acting, or technical

theater assignments, "anything to keep me involved in theater," he said.

MS. BEAN is a native of Farmington who grew up in theater, dancing at age 3 and acting at 6.

She cites her biggest theatrical accomplishment as "being cast as the only lead in Michigan Opera Theater's production of 'Showboat' who was not from New York or California. I auditioned against all of them and got the lead role. Really a feather in my cap."

All told, she estimates she has been the lead in about 50 shows stemming from her singing, dancing and acting talents.

Farmington Parks and Recreation Department is one of her main employers for teaching dance to youngsters in Shiawassee Recreation Center, Forest and Eagle elementary schools.

She produces one show a month for Southfield Repertory Theater and supervises street shows during the summer in Greenfield Village.

She holds a master's degree from Wayne State University in interpretative reading and theater and takes on the role of Anne Miller in "Six Rms Riv Vu," the story of two people who get themselves locked into an empty apartment each is trying to rent.

SANDY DITTRICH has an unusually expressive face which suits her well for the variety of roles she has taken on for Farmington Players, most recently the part of Mrs. Manningham in "Angel Street."

The editorial supervisor for Sports Unlimited plays the part of Janet Friedman, Paul's pregnant wife, in "Six Rms Riv Vu."

Ms. Ditttrich majored in drama and theater arts at Michigan State University and is a free-lance narrator-model who does voice-overs for Detroit radio commercials. Her most recent role in dinner theater was that of Tiffany Richards in "Mary, Mary."

ED KELLER, a computer operator by profession, said he joined the Farm-

ington Players "because I was ripe for some diversion."

With two small character roles behind him ("I think I was on stage longer for the curtain call than I was in my role," he said) he jumps to professional dinner theater playing the part of the superintendent.

"I've had no training," he said. "This is a hobby for me."

Erik Carlson has had both experience and intensive training in set construction, lights, stage managing and as a sound technician stemming from a Western Michigan University degree in communications arts and sciences.

On-stage work for him is relatively new.

"Before I got the part in 'Caught in the Villian's Web' (for Farmington Players) I was happy to be backstage," he said, "but all that cheering and yelling from the audience has become obsessive."

More cheering and yelling for Carlson followed with another role for the players in "Arsenic and Old Lace."

Carlson, an audio-visual technician for Oakland Community College's Highland Lakes Campus, takes his first professional acting role as Larry in (Continued on Page 4B)
