Let Paul Imman's experience be a warning to all fathers.

Imman, a resident of Farmington Hills, took his daughter Paula for a drive one fine day about seven years ago. Faula say some horses greating in calker ridding lessons.

Competing in the hunter classes is especially challenging because of the judging involved. Basically, in jumping, it doesn't matter how the horse clears the obstacles as long as it is done without knocking down a rail. Hunters, on the other hand, are judged on the

style in which they clear the obstacles. Judges look for horses that provide their riders with smooth, safe and com-fortable rides around the course.

THE COMPETITION in the junior hunter classes is tough, according to both of the Immas. It takes a lot of time working with the horse to get them to the point of being competive—Paula spends an hour and a half with each of her three hunters, six to seven days each week. During horse shows, she may be on the go competing and practicing from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.
