

Indians, Cards lead Pony League standings

The Cardinals opened the second half of the Farmington Pony National Baseball League with three straight victories, downing the Reds, 7-5, and the Dodgers, 7-3.

In the Farmington Pony American League, the Indians continued their winning streak with a 10-7 win over the Pirates.

Jeff Lawton, Chris Sieders and Rich Muller shared pitching duties for the Cardinals in the win over the Reds. Jim Giroux led the hitting assault with a pair of doubles.

Against the Dodgers, Jerry Nongren slashed a single to drive home the winning run in the fourth inning for the Cards. Jeff King and Dennis Coffey each had two hits and Sieders and Lawton combined on the mound to allow three runs on four hits.

In other Pony National League action, the Athletics edged the Pirates, 1-0, with Jeff Hines scoring the game's only run. Ivan Glasser and

Brian Kipp teamed to shut out the Pirates. Joshua Charlip was the losing pitcher for the Pirates.

THE INDIANS STARTED the second half of the Pony American season where they left off in the first — with a victory. Unbeaten in the season's first half, the Indians' got three hits from pitcher Kevin Geraghty in their win over the Pirates. Dave Kramer and Dave Maryas also pitched for the Indians.

The Indians' streak ended in the second game of the second half, as the Royals pounded out a 9-2 victory. Paul Urdan and Erik Zuckenberg combined on the mound for the Royals' win, with Mike Rambus, James Jones, Nick Merucci and Scott Draper contributing key hits.

In another Pony American League contest, the Orioles beat the Giants, 12-5. Dale Elenbaas was the winning pitcher, with Steve Zang and Randy Richardson also pitching.

Legion baseballers roughed up

Farmington's American Legion sandlot baseball team couldn't get the right combination of pitching and hitting last Sunday and ended up losing a doubleheader to Berkley, 15-9 and 3-0. The double loss ended a weekend of games for Farmington. On Friday, Steve Rutkowski and Jim Whitworth combined on a three-hit shutout victory over Chief Pontiac, 9-0.

On Saturday, Farmington split a doubleheader with Ferndale, losing the opener, 5-0, and winning the nightcap, 10-7.

The weekend set of games left Farmington with a 3-3 record and in a four-way tie for third place in its league. Berkley is first at 5-1, followed by Bloomfield Hills at 3-1 and Farmington, Ferndale, Chief Pontiac and Royal Oak at 3-3. Southfield and Auburn Heights are both 2-2. Novi and Lake Orion are 2-3 and Troy-Clawson and Milford are 1-3.

Although the league is divided into two divisions, only the two top teams in the league at the end of the year will advance to the American Legion regional tournament.

IN THE LOSSES to Berkley, Farmington had lots of hitting but no pitching in the first game and just the opposite in the second. Rich Nutter started the opener but was pulled after 2½ innings. Six runs were scored against him, but only one was earned.

Jim Whitworth relieved and got the side out in the third, but was tagged for four singles and a home run, good for six runs, in the fourth. Rutkowski came in for Whitworth and finished the game, allowing three runs in 3½ innings.

Farmington's bats came alive late in the contest as the team knocked out nine hits in the final three innings. Dave Schultz had two hits and two runs batted in, Dave Hall had two hits and knocked in one run and Bruce Morrison had a two-run double.

The nightcap was a pitchers' duel all the way. Berkley's Joe Baiallo got the best of it, shutting out Farmington on five hits. He struck out two and walked three.

Mike Tetreault started and took the loss for Farmington. He gave up two

earned runs on six hits and three walks while striking out five.

Farmington loaded the bases in the seventh inning with only one out, but Joe Hamilton hit into a double play to end the game. Barry Williams led Farmington's batsmen with two hits in three trips.

AGAINST FERDALE SATURDAY, Farmington loaded the bases in both the sixth and seventh innings of the first game but failed to score. Bob Davis limited Farmington to six hits and one walk. He fanned one.

Brian Bruce started and took the loss for Farmington. He allowed five hits and four walks and just one earned run. He struck out two.

The second game was decided in the first inning as Farmington struck for seven runs. Hamilton started the rally with a walk, Greg Kohnas was hit by a pitch and Dave Schultz had an infield hit to load the bases.

Pete Thompson's base hit brought in the first two runs and Morrison and

Williams each followed with run-scoring singles. Rex Baker then tripled to score Williams, and Morrison and Rob King singled in Baker with the seventh run.

Morrison went the distance for Farmington to collect the victory. Dan Murphy lasted one inning for Ferndale and was the loser. Tompson went three-for-three at the plate and knocked in four runs for Farmington.

IN THE VICTORY over Chief Pontiac Friday, Rutkowski started and surrendered just three hits in five innings. But when Pontiac loaded the bases with no one out in the sixth, Farmington manager Wally Christensen summoned relief ace Whitworth from the bullpen.

Whitworth responded with a brilliant performance, striking out the first two batters and getting the third man on a ground out. He followed that by striking out the side in the final inning.

Farmington had a 7-0 lead by the time Pontiac rallied in the sixth.

Beechview swimmers edged

CITY OF FARMINGTON COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS JUNE 16, 1980 (Summary)

A Regular Meeting of the Farmington City Council was held Monday, June 16, 1980, in the Council Chambers, 23000 Liberty Street, Farmington, Michigan. The meeting was called to order at 8:00 p.m. by Mayor William S. Hartsock.

PRESENT: Mayor Hartsock; Councilmen Bennett, Buckler, Tupper and Yoder.

ABSENT: None.

CITY OFFICIALS PRESENT: City Mgr. Deadman, Dir. Billing, Dir. Seifert, Atty. Kelly, City Clerk Viane.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved as corrected.

The minutes of other boards were received and/or filed.

The position of Oak Park regarding Settlement Day Meeting of General Law Township Boards was presented by Council.

A sign variance was granted to allow a temporary sign in the Downtown Center June 17-20, 1980.

A Proclamation was issued designating June 22-28, 1980 as "Amateur Radio Week". Council accepted the bid for Plastic Trash Can Liners in the amount of \$7,692.60 from Advance Bag Mfg. Company and established a price of \$9.50 per 100 bags in dispenser boxes.

City Mgr. was authorized to receive bids July 1, 1980 for improvements to the Municipal Building.

Council authorized disposal by cremation of canceled principal obligations and interest coupons stored by the city and those which may be issued and redeemed in the future; and authorized the National Bank of Detroit to dispose of those bonds and interest coupons presently stored by the Bank or which may be acquired in the future. Council authorized a reduction in the city's contribution to the Farmington Community Library for FY 1980-81.

Council authorized the City Manager to prepare a Charter Amendment question for the November, 1980 ballot adjusting the date for approval of the city's budget.

Traffic Safety Project reports were received.

Council authorized the purchase of two Administrative vehicles and one Pick-up Truck.
