The two Mercy High School graduates and best friends since the seventh grade bucked their families' Republican leanings and became active in the Young Democrats two years ago. Last year with a presidential election on the horizon, they studied the candidates and decided to lend their active support to the Kennedy campaign. Their decisions to join the party and work for Kennedy stem from their concern that the country has become lax over helping those who can't help themselves.

"I think the Republicans are unwilling to spend money where it's needed,"

"I'M DISSATISFIED with Carter. He wants to be a hero abroad. He's not paying attention to domestic prob-lems," said Ms. Vernava, who plans to become an opthomologist. they gave out candy plastered with Kennedy stickers.

Although she's working for Kenne-dy's campaign, Ms. Vernava doesn't think he'll manage to upset Carter at this late data this late date.

BUT MS. Horvath, a self-described optimist thinks that there might be a slim chance left.

"I still hold out hope. In the past year so many unbelievable things have happened. Something has to be done to change the situation. I don't like the Republican candidates. Kennedy is the best man for the job. I hope everyone sees it that way."
