

Glen swimmers swamp Village club

Farmington Glen Athletic Club, behind record-setting performances by Jim Vlk and Alec Campbell, swept to a 290-269 victory over Village Athletic Club of Southfield Thursday.

It was the second straight victory for Glen in the Northwest Suburban Swim League (NSSL) Village, meanwhile, lost by a close margin for the second consecutive week in an NSSL meet.

Vlk, swimming in the 9-10 age divi-

sion for Glen, set his record in the boys' 50-meter butterfly (37.2). Vlk also won the 50-meter freestyle (34.5).

Campbell established new team marks in both the boys' 13-14 50-meter fly (29.9) and 100-meter individual medley (1:48.0).

Other Glen double-winners were Paul Larson in the boys' 15-17 100-meter fly (1:01.4) and 50-meter fly (30.4) and Cindy Meil in the girls' 13-14

50-meter breaststroke (37.4) and 100-meter individual medley (1:17.8).

DESPITE THE SETBACK, Village had its share of fine swimmers, including five double-winners. Three of the double-winners were in the 15-17 age division.

See MacMillan and Beth Saunders each won a pair of events in the 15-17 group. MacMillan's wins were in the

50-meter breast (39.0) and 100-meter individual medley (1:15.0), while Saunders captured the 100-meter free (1:04.9) and the 50-meter fly (32.59).

The third 15-17 age division double-winner for Village was Kurt Maczel, who finished on top in the boys' 100-meter individual medley (1:07.76) and 50-meter backstroke (32.9).

Other Village double-winners were

Marilee Konecal in the girls' 11-12 50-meter back (38.31) and 50-meter free (31.21) and Becky Wyquist in the girls' 7-8 25-meter back (25.1) and 25-meter free (20.3).

FIVE SWIMMERS were double-winners for Village in its season-opening loss to Rochester Heart of the Hills. Maczel won the boys' 15-17 50-meter

back (31.7) and 50-meter fly (30.8).

Konecal finished first in the girls' 11-12 50-meter back (38.1) and 50-meter free (31.0); Pam Saunders took the girls' 13-14 50-meter back (35.1) and 50-meter free (31.3); Mike Schuler won the boys' 11-12 50-meter free (31.4) and 50-meter breast (41.4); and Kirby Shedden captured the boys' 7-8 25-meter free (19.9) and 25-meter fly (27.2).

Churchill's Price hangs it up as Charger cage coach

Fred Price, boys' basketball coach at Livonia Churchill, has resigned and will be replaced by Don Albertson.

Albertson has coached the boys' JV basketball team at Churchill the past two seasons. He has also coached the girls' varsity basketball squad the last two years.

Price, who is also boys' track coach and chairman of the physical education department at Churchill, said he relinquished his basketball duties in an effort to cut down on some of his activities.

Price said he plans to continue coaching track. Churchill has won nine Western Six League track championships in a row under Price's tutelage.

"IT GOT to be that I didn't have the time available to give

it (basketball) time. It got to be a complete, all-around job," said Price. "Basketball, for a coach, somehow has become a year-around program."

Price served as JV boys' basketball coach at Churchill from 1969 through the 1976-77 season.

During three varsity seasons, Price's teams have posted records of 11-11 (1979-80), 7-13 (1978-79) and 13-7 (1977-78).

Price's best conference finish was third place his first year.

Price said that he no longer felt he could do a good job coaching both basketball and track on a back-to-back basis.

Price has become more and more disenchanted recently with all the time that must be devoted to off-season basketball clinics and summer leagues.

Family considerations also figured into the decision, Price

said.

"To do justice to the family, I owe them some priority time now instead of waiting until the kids get to be 16 or 17 and wish I had," he said.

SURPRISINGLY, Albertson will continue to coach the girls' basketball team during the fall and the boys' team in the winter.
