Baker's slam lifts Legion team

Rex Baker of North Farmington slugged a lead-off home run in the top of the 11th inning to push Farmington Legion to a 2-1 baseball victory over Novi on Wednesday.

Baker's game-winning hit gave the victory to Steve Rutkowski, who turned in a superb job of relief pitching. Rutkowski took over for Jim Whitworth with one out in the fifth inning and allowed just one hit and three walks in the next 5 1/2 innings. He struck out six.

Both teams scored a run in the fifth. With two out in the top half of the inning, Farmington's Rich Nutter doubled to rightfield and Dave Schultz singled him home.

NOVI KNOTTED the score with a run in the bottom of that inning, scoring on two singles and a wild pitch by Whitworth.

Bob Bishop started and went 10 innings for Novi, limiting Farmington to just five hits. He struck out four but walked eight. Whitworth gave up four hits and a walk in his mound stint for Farmington, surrendering one unearned run. He fanned six.

Dave Hall collected two hits in five trips for Farmington. Nutter went 1-for-3 and scored one run, and Baker had one hit in two official trips. Nutter and Baker walked three times apiece.

The victory raised Farmington's record to 4-3 in the league. On Wednesday, the team travels to Auburn Heights for an 8 p.m. contest, then hosts Bloomfield Hills in a double-header Friday at Drake Park. Game time is 2 p.m.

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Michigan trails in retail trade

In what may come as no surprise to Michigan residents, the state ranks first in new car registrations per capita — and most of these cars are American made.

But while residents may buy a lot of new cars, the overall gain in retail trade lags behind the rest of the nation, according to David I. Verway, a research professor in the Graduate School of Business Administration at Michigan State University.

Statistics compiled by the Census of Retail Trade show that the state's retail trade grew by 55 percent between 1972 and 1977, lagging behind the national average of 58 percent. That puts Michigan 12th from the bottom if the states are ranked from the biggest increases to the least increases.

According to Verway, grocery store sales in the state increased by 39 percent during that five-year period, much below the national average of 58 percent, and that's the main reason overall sales lagged behind the national average.

Smaller families, particularly those without children who eat out in restaurants, and fewer people stocking provisions at their summer cottages has hurt grocery store sales in the state, said Verway.

Places to eat are more common than any other type of retail establishment. Both in Michigan and nationwide, according to Verway. In 1977, eating establishments in the state employed 142,000 people, or 27 percent of all retail employees; but because they are so labor intensive, they accounted for only 7 percent of the retail sales in the state.

The number of gasoline service stations in the state dropped from 8,919 in 1972 to 6,572 in 1977, but because of the increase in the price of a gallon of gas, sales increased from \$1.4 billion to \$2.5 billion.

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CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS SUMMARY OF PROCEEDINGS CITY COUNCIL MEETING JUNE 23, 1980

The City Council of the City of Farmington Hills held a regular meeting June 23, 1980. Mayor Soronen opened the meeting at 7:30 P.M. Members present were: Burwell, Lange, Oppenhausser, Soronen, Wolf, Alkateh and Dolan. Others present were City Manager Savage, City Clerk Cairns and City Attorney Bibeau.

Council approved the minutes of the study of June 2 and regular meeting of June 9, 1980.

After the public hearing the consideration of participation in the Oakland County Civil Defense and Disaster Warning System Program was denied by Council.

Approval was given to the contract of \$16,000 to be paid to Orchard Ridge Campus of Oakland Community College and appropriated \$2,300 subject to an agreement between the City and the Community College.

Public Hearing was set for July 21, 1980 for water improvement in West Gate Franklin Village, east hearing.

Council enacted the following Zoning Ordinance Amendments: C82-215 lots 4 & 5 of Kensington Gardens in the NE 1/4 of Section 35 to rezone from RA-1 to RC-1; C82-217 parcels 23-042-251-002 in the NE 1/4 of Section 10 to rezone from RA-1 to OS-1; C82-218 parcel 23-032-228-001 in the NE 1/4 of Section 30 to rezone from RA-1 to OS-1; C82-219 parcels of land 23-211-452-003 & 005 in the SE 1/4 of Section 21 to rezone from RA-1 to RC-2 and RC-2 to RA-1.

Reapproval was given to Independent Expressway Service Center Plan.

The Mayor and the City Clerk were authorized to sign consent to amend declaration of restrictions for Meadowlark Subdivision.

Cost Public Hearing for water improvement on Greening from Burbank to Thirteen Mile Road was set for July 11, 1980.

Consideration of approval of judgment confirming satisfactory use in the case of Sol Soeslar vs City of Farmington Hills involving the site of building sites in Oakland Subdivision in Section 3 was adjourned pending further investigation of the case.

Approval was given to hiring of six part time employees for the summer recreation program within the second degree of consanguinity or affinity of the City employees etc.

No action was taken to establish a Special Assessment District for road improvement on Gilchrist in Franklin Knolls Subdivision.

No action was taken on an Agreement between City of Farmington Hills and Villanor Associates, Inc., as Planning Consultant.

Council approved Special Assessment to be assigned to the 1980 July tax roll.

No action was taken on the request from Kelli Lynn, Inc. for transfer of ownership of 1980 Class C licensed business with Dance Permit, located at 30880 Orchard Lake Road and adjacent to the intersection of 1980 Class C license to be located at 28900 and 29100 Orchard Lake Road.

Mayor's appointment to Boards and Commissions were approved as follows:

Dorothy Gordon to the Beautification Commission term to expire 6/30/81; Kal R. Hinds to the Building Appeals Board term to expire 6/30/82; Marlow Balaguer to the Farmington Area Arts Commission term to expire 6/30/83; Richard Lawrence, James L. Pierce and Michael A. Sklar to the Industrial & Economic Development Commission term to expire 6/30/83; Dennis Fitzgerald to Parks & Recreation Commission term to expire 6/30/83; Jean Fox to the Zoning Board of Appeals term to expire 6/30/83; James R. Doe III to the Pension Commission term to expire 12/31/83 and Marcia Neece to the Pension Commission term to expire 12/31/83.

City Manager's recommendation to enter into a contract with Hubbell Roth and Clark for a master storm drainage plan, not to exceed \$150,000 was approved.

Amendments to the 1979/80 budget preliminary to closing out the fiscal year were approved.
