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"Third finger, left hand" This simple phrase conveys a great deal in spite of its laconic colloquialism. However, as strange as it may seem to us today, there has been no hard and set rule as to which finger or which hand the "hearts" were to be worn on until recent history.
The ancient Romans thought that they had discovered the "heart finger" They thought that the veins amoris or love vein flowed directly up this third finger to the heart. This was supposed to be true of both hands, but custom soon began to favor the left. For... was the weakest finger and didn't symbolize woman's dependence upon her husband?
Custom became sanctioned by authority. The Book of Common Prayer of Edward VI (1549) decrees that the left hand is the hand of matrimony. In the 19th Century, when the church ordered that the bonds of matrimony be posted, the betrothal ring took its rightful place on that finger as well as the wedding ring. Today, both rings are worn on the "third-finger, left hand."
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
