

Pair summer cycle to Alaska

The smell of new places, the lure of a strange road and the thrill of fighting the elements played their siren's song for Frank Bethard and Larry Schroed-

er.

The two are riding their motorcycles from their Boca Raton, Fla. homes to Anchorage, Alaska. They hope to drive 400 miles of gravel roads through Canada to their destination by July 16.

For Bethard, 62, and Schroeder, 44, the trip offers a sense of adventure and a chance to indulge in one of their favorite pasttimes, riding their cycles.


"It gives you a sense of freedom,"
said Bethard, whose interest in biking
spans 50 years.

"You become part of the elements.
You're more aware of the odors in a
city and the temperature. It's not like
sitting back in an air-conditioned car or
a heated car," said Schroeder.

"I was going through Atlanta with the dogwood in bloom. You can smell the odors of a city."

The duo recently stopped to visit Robert Hood in his Farmington Hills home.

"They called me and asked, "Could we stop off at your place for a hot shower," Hood said.

The ambitious trip began several months ago when a friend of Schroeder's came up with the ifeas of biking to Alaska. When it turned out that the friend couldn't go, Schroeder kept on planning his trip, waiting for another traveling partner to arrive on the scene.

Scene. Bethard became that partner after another mutual friend convinced him to join Schroeder on the trip. Besides his long standing interest in motorcycles, Bethard saw another advantage in making the trek. His son, Frank Jr., daughter-in-law Kathy and grandchildren, Britan, 34°, Todd, 54° and Heather, 84°, live in Anchorage.

Since June 30, the pair have put in long days on their bikes. Bethard's Honda 750 is followed by his partner's Yamaha 1100 plus a small trailer.

"He looks like he's riding with training wheels when I use both of the mirrors on my bike," Bethard joked.

"Sometimes, I ride like that too," Schroeder said.
Unlike Bethard, Schroeder's interest in motorcycles began one year ago when he helped a friend pick out a new bike. He's so enamored of the vehicle he takes his wife Joy out to Sunday breakfast on it. breakfast on it.

THE ONLY HITCHES in the trip they foresee are the gravel roads and the weather. For the rider of a motorcycle, 75 de-gree weather can mean pilling on a warm jacket to shield him from the

warm jacket to shield him from the wind.
Gravel roads'are the most difficult to traverse, according to the two.
"It's going to be quite a challenge. You have to watch out for three diseases, corner-lits, gravel rash and el-bow-itis." Betand cracked.
As translated by Bethard, themeans a cyclist must watch out for becoming too afraid of turning a corner on a gravel road. Riders have to take care not to spill their bikes on gravel roads and pick up an armful of souve-nir gravel.

So far on their trip, the two riders have met with encouragement from other travelers:

"We get a hig grin a wave and good luck from people in cars and other cyclists," said Schroeder.

"That's unexpected if you're on a motorcycle. I expected a cool reception. That's not the case at all. People have been extremely funny," he said.

Both claim that a motorcycle is more comfortable than riding a car.

"YOU'RE MORE relaxed than when you're driving a car. There's a physical tenseness between the shoulder blades that doesn't go away. Physically, that's the only thing that bothers you." Schroeder said. Schroeder's wife will meet then Regina, Saskatchewan.
"I promised her that we'd go to a hotel once a week," he said. That shouldn't pose a problem.
"It's been a pire week and so far."

"It's been a nice week and so far we've been 100 proof (by staying in motels each night.) We haven't unfold-ed the tent yet."
