

NFWB Koufax keeps winning

The North Farmington/West Bloomfield Metro-Sportabout team opened its Sandy Koufax baseball season with five- and six-game winning streaks as it pushed its record to a commanding 11-1.

Todd Williams, Rich Goldberg, Zac Childress, Bob Butler, Eric Kahkonen and John Collins all contributed to the team's fast start.

In its latest outing, Williams, with sixth-inning relief help from Goldberg, pushed Metro-Sportabout past West-

land, 2-0, in the second game of a double-header. Childress had two hits in the contest.

In the first game, Childress picked up the win as Goldberg again relieved in a 7-3 triumph. Goldberg also had three hits in the game.

A seven-run first inning gave Metro-Sportabout a 10-2 victory over Plymouth Canton. Goldberg pitched the first five innings to gain the win. Kahkonen went three-for-four, including a three-run triple in the first inning.

The team improved its record to 8-1 with a 14-5 victory over South Lyon. Butler, Childress and Collins each had three hits in the game.

BEFORE THAT VICTORY came a sweep of a double-header against Grosse Ile by 10-3 and 10-3 scores.

Butler and John Connor were the winning pitchers, both getting relief help from Kahkonen. Bill Kauka, Scott Roman, Goldberg, Williams and Childress each had three-hit games.

Metro-Sportabout's five-game win streak was broken in a loss to Redford West-7 by a 9-7 score. Collins and Goldberg each had three hits in the game, with Collins slamming a two-run homer.

Earlier victories included a win over Plymouth Salem in nine innings; an 11-1 trouncing of Dearborn Crestwood behind Goldberg's three hits and three RBIs; 8-1 against Detroit Mic Mac; 13-8 over Plymouth Canton; and 10-2 in the season-opener against Southfield.

ly — and with detail — with all the excitement that you originally had.

"You will be able to see the excitement and pleasure that you originally had," Morris continues to say, as soft music plays in the background.

"The crowd grows and grows with excitement each time you knock the puck away from the goal. You will be able to relive this with all the excitement, with all the pleasure, with all the vividness you once had."

"Having done your job very well, your mind will feel good. Your team comes to cheer you — patting you on the back — thankful that you've done a good job. . . . Each time you see the puck close to the goal, you say to yourself — RELAX. . . ."

SO, THROUGH this therapy, Vachon finally improved his play after three

poor seasons. He showed signs of regaining the form that made him the premier goaltender in the National Hockey League six years ago. And he didn't fear the puck — as some experts believed.

"I did feel a lot better this year," Vachon said. "I really never had a fear for the puck. I got hit a couple of times this year — that's part of the game."

"The year was going well until the last month-and-a-half of the season."

Those six weeks — that's the period when Vachon, and his teammates, played very poorly and lost a chance to make the playoffs.

"What about those six weeks?"

"EVERY TIME YOU don't make the playoffs, and people say we have the players to make the playoffs — and we did — we just didn't play as a team," Vachon said.

As far as Vachon's play at that peri-

od, Morris has another theory.

"The biggest problem with Rogie was that he was burned out. He was worked too hard," Morris said. "He'd come in and say, 'So, I'm tired — I'm physically and mentally tired.'"

Vachon did play the majority of Wings' games in goal — and he played in all the big games.
