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Some of the classiest restaurants in metropolitan Detroit are in the northern suburbs.

The area covering Birmingham-Bloomfield, West Bloomfield, Trosuthfield, Farmington and Rochester has dining spots that lure patrons from all over metropolitan Detroit.

Starting with Birmingham, the Midtown Cafe (139 S. Woodward, phone 642-1133) has the continental charm of a European cafe. Offering dishes concentrating on fresh ingredients, Midtown is contemporary in decor and designed to encourage leisurely conversation.

W. Ten Mile Road, phone 559-4230) depends on the flourish of Che Milo, formerly chef of Detroit's extravagant pondon Chophouse. The rich dishes please the palate of a gournet.
The Vineyards (29230 Franklin, phone 357-2579) has a long history of excellence, its interior a warm backdrop for the food specialities including past nork.

The Excalibur (28875 Franklin, phone 588-3385) maintains a following serving veal picentit, yed marsala and veal Excalibur. Plants and booths accent the room.

The Benchmark in the Michigan Inn (16400 J.L. Hudson Drive, phone 559-5500) has an elaborate menu and a sumptious setting. The food consistently rates high, making this hotel spot once that is out of the ordinary.

The Botsford Inn (28000 Grand Riv-er, phone 474-4800) is notable for being Michigan's oldest surviving country inn. Built in 1836, the white frame inn captures the mellowness of the past. You'll get a good meal here.

The Wing Hong Restaurant and Wing Hong Tokyo Japanese Steakhouse (31455 W. 14 Mile Road, phone 851-7000) is where a Chinese or Japanese meal can be enjoyed. The steakhouse is an addition that recreates the authenticity of a Japanese teahouse.

DIGGERS, formerly Clamdiggers (30555 Grand River, phone 478-3800) is another Chuck Muer fun palace for those who like seafood. Diggers still has fresh, daily seafood specialties but

now spotlights casual snacks and ala carte ordering for easy-on-the-pocket-book meal In Rochester, the Cooper's Arms (306 S, Main, phone 651-2266) has been under the guidance of owner Roger Knapp since it opened nine years ago. The English Tudor restaurant is a friendly place to dine on fresh fith, prime meats and chef's specialties.

10-01 North Main is the name of the restaurant (1002 N. Main, phone 552-7333) that opened earlier this year and has become a favorite dining spot. The light, airy decor is relaxing for partaking of everything from hambur

In Avon Township, Win Schuler's (2601 S. Rochester, phone 852-8330) takes on a contemporary air, with stained glass and plants backdropping the meals. A big, five-course dinner of traditional Schuler fare is one of the highlights.

Gus' Steakhouse (655 Michaelson, phone 693-8882) has the added charm of being located in the Rochester Golf and Country Club. Menu offerings please steak lovers especially.

FOXY'S (1254 Walton Blvd., phone 652-1177) is another Harris Machus restaurant, this one with such diversity as crepes, quiches and Mexican food.

The Oceania Inn (68 N. Adams, phone 375-9200) is inside the quaint MeadowBrook Village Mall, but it has a lavishly decorated dinging room and a menu of exquisite Oriental dishes.
