Blue jeans, pizza, rock 'n roll ... convention gears up at Cobo

GOP hysteria!

Observations from this week's Republican National Convention preliminaries at Cobo Hall:

While members of the GOP platform committees debate women's rights, foreign policy and other hot issues in assigned rooms, convention people are wandering through the halls, veering off onto escalators or down stairways or into rooms.

You can tell who they are if you get up close and look at the indentification tags hanging from chains around their

A majority of them appear to be members of the news media. The mass-es of convention delegates are due in this weekend, but will still be out-numbered by the news coverage peo-

The most apparent color is blue—blue on security people like Detroit police and private guarts; blue jeans on members of the news media, especially men and women carrying large TV cameras and small press cameras; blue work clothes on people still putting down carpet and others driving cargo vehicles through the long halls of Cobo; and blue as in red, white and blue posters, badges and flyers.

of people talking, backgrounded by telephones ringing, typewriters clicking.

Sound appeared to be the cause of some conflict Tuesday afternoon between press people and sound people getting set up for the Foghat rock concert later that night in Cobo.

The Foghat crew, just across the hall from the press setup, was tuning up their mountains of sound equipment by blasting it out.

"Hey, turn that down or turn it off, there are press people trying to work over here," complained an angry man.

"This is just ridiculous," said Jim Slisko, stage manager of Foghat.

"They're trying to tell us we can't work. It's not our fault they scheduled us the same time as this convention."

"Vote Democratic," shouted another member of the band crew in the direc-tion of the complainer. It was a stand-

THERE'S NO contest for the most elaborate set-up. This award must be divided among the three major TV net-works which have set up their own cit-

At the height of the convention next week, each network will have 800 to 1,000 news and camera people and technicians on hand.

Ron Rhodes, production coordinator for ABC's convention complex, said Tuesday he had about 700 in town and more coming.

"We've been setting up here since May 3. We're getting tired and things are getting a bit heetic and testy," said Rhodes. "But it's also building with excitement now that the convention is about ready to roll."

ABC newsman Max Robinson is already broadcasting the 7 p.m. "World News Tonight" from their studio at Cobo. "Our convenion coverage, Good morning America' and 'Nightline' will be broadcast directly from our set-up at the Joe Louis Arena (where the actual covention will be held Monday through Thursday.)

"Just as soon as this is over, we pack it all up and move it to New York for the Democratic National Convention," said Rhodes.

Most of the multi-million ABC equip-ment for convention converage is new,

according to Rhodes. After the conven-tions the equipment will be used to up-date the equipment in their New York studios.

INTERVIEWED in the hallway at Cobo, Detroit Police Sgt. Evo Guerrini said his operation was getting organized. "I just started here yesterday," said Guerrini. "I'm normally a plain clothes detective. This is the first time I've had a uniform on since I can't remember when and it feels strange.

"Some people are asking us for di-rections," said Guerrini, "but most of them seem to know where they're going."

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
