

OCC board mum on 5-2 split votes

EARL ANDERSON, a member of the OCC board since the two-year college was founded in 1984, was elected chairman in one split vote.

Mrs. Ritter, a teacher who has been on the board since 1978, nominated Anderson as "the only remaining charter board member who has not served as chairman."

Voting for Anderson were Mrs. Ritter, Suzanne Reynolds, a teacher who was elected in 1976; Richard Pappas and Margaret MacTavish, both of whom were elected June 9 and attending their first meetings as trustees. Anderson himself abstained on his own election.

Mrs. Johnson and Hackett, both long-time board members, voted for Hackett. Mrs. Johnson made no nominating speech.

The other split vote occurred on the relatively obscure post of alternate delegate to the Michigan Community College Association.

Mrs. Reynolds was nominated by Anderson and also supported by Mrs. Ritter, Pappas and Mrs. MacTavish.

Mrs. Johnson nominated Mrs. MacTavish, who said after the meeting she was unaware she would be nominated.

IN UNCONTESTED votes, the board elected:

- Sandra Ritter MOCA delegate.
- Suzanne Reynolds vice-chairperson.
- Anthony Jarson, college controller, for a new term as board treasurer.
- Helen Kaiser, veteran board secretary, for a new term.

Chairman Anderson, a champion of greater OCC involvement in vocational-technical offerings, is a veteran of the labor movement.

"I was Dick Frankenstein's right-hand man," he said, referring to the United Auto Workers vice-president in the 1930s and '40s.

Anderson was an organizer in the UAW's Chrysler and aircraft departments until leaving the UAW in 1949 to become a labor relations consultant for both business and management. He is now "partially retired."

Born in Minnesota and raised in Detroit, Anderson worked in 1932-33 as a bodyguard for United Mine Workers

President John L. Lewis before returning to the Detroit area.

Intensely proud of his associations with Frankenstein and the UAW, Anderson contrasted it to the operation of the Teamsters. "If I'm head of a UAW bargaining unit that goes on strike, I don't get paid while that local is on strike," he said.

Other differences: Leonard Woodcock was paid a top of \$65,000 while head of the UAW while the Teamsters' Frank Fitzsimmons was paid \$165,000; and UAW leaders consider themselves trustees of the organization, "and answerable to the members, rather than treating the organization as if it were the officers' private property."

As chairman, Anderson will preside at regular once-a-month board meetings in OCC's administration building in Bloomfield Hills and at frequent special board meetings.

This week's Monday night meeting was a rarity because of the Fourth of July holiday last week. The OCC board nearly always meets on Thursdays.
