"Reagan as a political performer has been underestimated. His extreme stands and the impression of him as a militarist linger. The platform the Republican adopted is largely a Reagan product and only stregthens that perception," says Johannsen.

"What with his two ambassadorships
and his directing the CIA (Central Inchiligence Agency) his experience
doesn't amount to more than a few
years — but that's more than Reagan's

By then it will be important for him to get back, he said. "It's important to stay in touch with the thinking and per-ceptions of the (Swedish) people back home," he said.
