Although forming the new church is Rev. Farley's first assignment as a Lutheran pastor, this is not his first experience in organizing a new congregation. During his internship he helped found Good Shepherd Lutheran Church in Beaverton, Minn.

PASTOR FARLEY left Redford in 1957 when his family moved to St.

A newly ordained pastor returned to the area where he grew up to form a new Lutheran church under the suspices of the Wisconsin Evangelical Lutheran Synod.

Rev. David J. Farley, who is a native of Redford, will organize the new congregation and become its first pastor in the Farmington Hills-Novi area.

Services are scheduled to begin Sept. 14.

Since Pastor Farley's congregation is as yet without a regular worship facility, he was ordained at a sister congregation, St. Paul Lutheran Church in Livonia, shortly after his arrival here in mid-July.

Although forming the new church is

conservative Lutheranism, describes itself as uncompromising in its dedication to confessional Lutheranism."

"Because of its adherence to the Bible as insired, inernal Word of God, the synod has experienced rapid growth over the past decade," Rev. Farley said.

THE CHURCH body is composed of more than 1,100 congregations throughout the U.S. although its name still reflects its 1842, mid-western be-

It maintains one of the largest elementary school systems among Protestant church bodies, a seminary, three colleges and its Lutheran high schools. Members of the symod support 250 mission churches in the U.S. and Canada. Missionaries are supported in Africa, South America, Japan, India, the West Indies, Mexico, Puerto Rico, Inference and Home Korp.
