"So far, we have been able to spend 57 percent of the millage money on expansion and development. If the millage lost, you would have a status quo parks system."

R. Eric Reickel, director of the Oakland Dounty Parks and Recreation Department, is working to make his program a household word for a pair of reasons.

One is that "we teach people how to show it. The last renewal passed comfortably in May of 1976, just as the economy was emerging from a serious recession.

The most common question he gets is this: When the park system charges a \$2 per car user fee (\$3 for non-residents), why is a quarter-mill property tax needed?

The answer: Those fees cover operations. The bulk of the tax money is used to buy property and develop the system. Increasingly, however, the tax money, too, is being used for operations. WHERE DOES IT go?

Of the total, \$3.6 million is for operations. That's almost double what user fees bring in. Thus, the millage brings in half the operating money and most of the \$58.000 for capital.
