DELTA KAPPA GAMMA SOCIETY members gather in the Renaissance Center July 29 to Aug. 2 for its biennial international convention hosted by local chapters of the honorary association of women educators.

One of the host chapters is Beta Eta which draws members from the Farmington-Clearanceville area.

Among those from Beta Eta who have important assignments during the convention are Dorothy Bennett, in charge of all properties, Beverly Ellis, assistant registrar, and Kay Briggs, statistician.

Others who are working to make things run smoothly are Dinghy Sharp, Nancy Simanek, Jeannette Senob, Dor-

othy Lingquist, Norma Kitzman, Betty Pillar and Marion Rosbott.

The group is the largest of its kind, united in efforts to assist women who want to pursue advanced education and improve professional status. The society's 150,000 members work toward common goals even though they are distributed throughout 12 countries.

From 1960-1980 members gave more than half a million dollars to assist 135 women from 35 countries to study in the U.S. The contributions were voluntary and the women who came here to study have attended 62 different universities.

Presently there is a scholarship recipient from South America attending University of Michigan.

The society has also invested \$1.5 million in scholarships for its own members. Locally, Beta Eta has donated funds for the past six years for Grants-in-Aid to students at Oakland Community College, Orchard Ridge Campus and Schoolcraft College. Last year the group celebrated its 50th anniversary.

There is no charge. Registrations will be taken at the door Monday morning.

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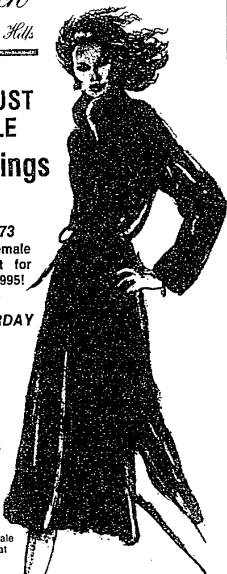
