Women engineers on the move

Sixty-six of Michigan State Universi-ty's spring graduates in engineering nave begun making names for them-selves as women successful in what has been for decades men's turf.

The women represented 16 percent of the total of 368 earning bachelor's degrees in spring term.

Not only are the MSU women engineers being accepted by employers who are "very pleased" with them, they are being offered salaries in excess of those offered to their male counterparts.

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Rebecca Yost of MSU's placement Services said MSU women chemical engineering grads with bachelor's de-grees were being offered an average of \$1,836 a month, compared with \$1,780 for men.


The larger offers, Ms. Yost said, also came for women engineers with bachelor's degrees in electrical engineering with \$1,756 offered compared to \$1,724 for men, in mechanical engineering, £1,694 compared to \$1,684; in computer science, with \$1,693 compared to \$1,608; and civil engineering, \$1,609 are compared to \$1,608; and civil engineering, \$1,693 compared to \$1,5684.



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
