

Women lawyers elect new slate of officers

Mrs. Wolock is a cum laude graduate of the Detroit College of Law where she was editor-in-chief of the first "Detroit College of Law Review."

She served as law clerk to Judge John H. Gillis and Judge Michael J. Kelly, both of the Michigan Court of Appeals. She was an associate with the law firm of Davidson, Gotsjall, Kohl, Seerest, Wardle, Lynch and Clark of Farmington Hills for more than three years.

Women engineers on the move

Sixty-six of Michigan State University's spring graduates in engineering have begun making names for themselves as women successful in what has been for decades men's turf.

The women represented 16 percent of the total of 368 earning bachelor's degrees in spring term.

Not only are the MSU women engineers being accepted by employers who are "very pleased" with them, they are being offered salaries in excess of those offered to their male counterparts.

Rebecca Yost of MSU's placement Services said MSU women chemical engineering grads with bachelor's degrees were being offered an average of \$1,836 a month, compared with \$1,780 for men.

The larger offers, Ms. Yost said, also came for women engineers with bachelor's degrees in electrical engineering, with \$1,763 offered compared to \$1,724 for men; in mechanical engineering, \$1,694 compared to \$1,688; in computer science, with \$1,693 compared to \$1,606; and civil engineering, \$1,693 compared to \$1,564.

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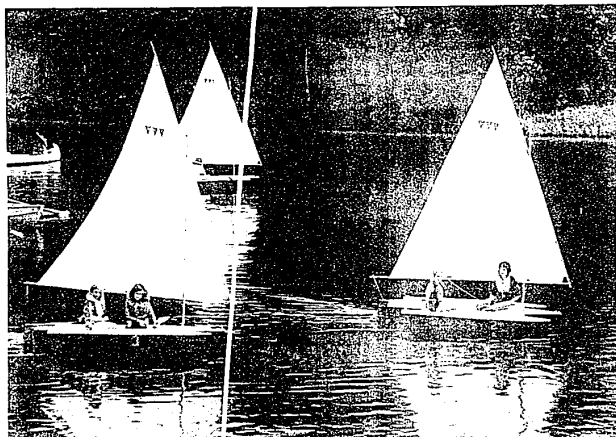
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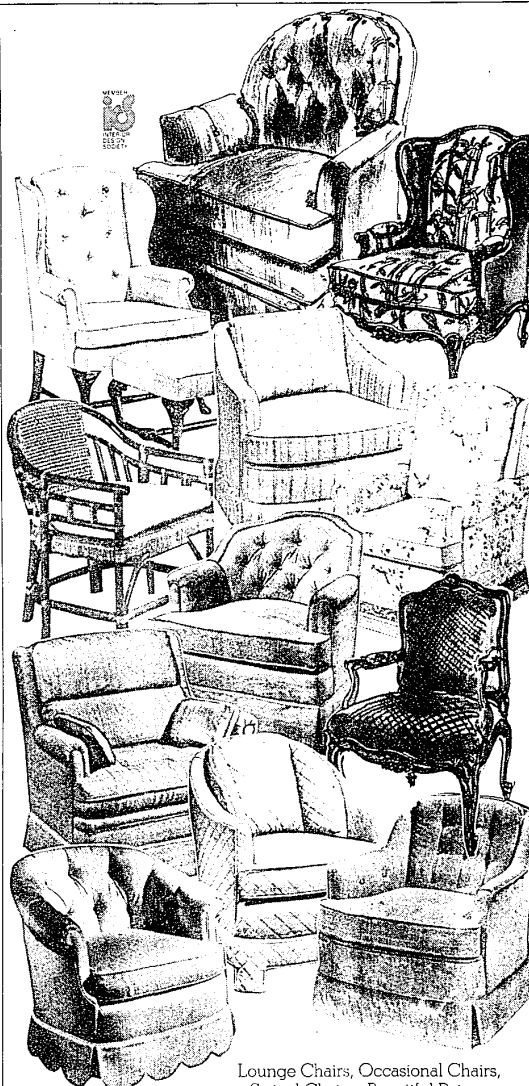
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
