The cast succeeds despite the unimaginative direction of Beverly Lloyd. Genner deserves blame for the poor representation of Schroeder, and Patty in the script. They are given very little to do. Miss Lloyd furthers this by giving them very little to do on stage. As director, she should have given Warner Iseppi and Jessie Youngblood, Schroeder and Patty respectively, comic bits which would have made them a more integral part of the show. To let talented actors stand helplessly or turn set pieces is ludicrous.

The cast manages to overcome the long unnecessary blackouts between sketches and burst forth with radiance, especially Nona Colborne as Snoopy. His flair for comedy is evidence that his innovative peformance is imaginatively of his own doing.

Colborne comes on with such vigorous excitement, anyone who knows the show is sitting in high anticiption of the "Suppertime" number. We are not disappointed. The number is delightful.

HOLDING ONTO his blanket for dear life, Jon Katz plays Linus with a perfect brainy-innocence. This is his first appearance with the Troy Players. Brian Juleff is just right as Charlie

Juleff is hardly the battered butter-ball Charlie Brown. He is tall and good looking, but he manages to overcome these positive attributes with a slump-shouldered, inferority-complexed stage presence.
